Sul Ross State University is a regional comprehensive state university with an enrollment of almost 3000 students including the three remote communities of Del Rio, Eagle Pass, and Uvalde as an off campus center called the Rio Grande College of Sul Ross State University. Accomplishments include:

- Conducted first major development campaign which surpassed the challenge goal by more than 10%
- Increased endowments from \$1.0 Million to \$13.0 Million.
- Organized and conducted the Universities 75th Diamond Jubilee Celebration
- Spearheaded the first major construction on campus since the mid 60's with the completion of a new 59,000 square foot University Center and the construction of a new 3,200 seat multi-purpose center.
- Oversaw the renovation of five major buildings
- Eliminated all deferred maintenance in academic facilities

- Successfully implemented a system of shared governance and a *Student Centered Campus* philosophy
- Established a monthly breakfast for community leaders to discuss mutually beneficial topics
- Implemented first two-way interactive distance learning courses in 1994
- Implemented the first administrator evaluation system on campus and expanded the system to all non-faculty employees
- Achieved separate funding as an upper level center for the Uvalde Study Center and organized a community effort in the three communities of Del Rio, Eagle Pass, and Uvalde to achieve consensus for and obtain legislative approval to rename the center as the Rio Grande College of Sul Ross State University
- Traveled to Qatar to negotiate contracts with the National Petroleum Corporation for the education of Qatar students in Texas universities through the Texas International Education Consortium
- Developed and implemented SRSU's first articulation agreement with the Universidad Autónoma de Chihuahua for educational exchange programs and cooperative relationships in business, agriculture and the sciences, and established an MBA Program in Chihuahua, Mexico.
