

CJ #2323 Aspects of Law Enforcement

Spring 2015 Web Based

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Course Description:

This course will explore police authority and responsibilities regarding criminal procedure as well as constitutional restraints as enumerated in the Texas Constitution, United States Constitution, and Bill of Rights. Upon completion of this course students should be able to understand police authority, the court system and process, sources of rights, and the law of arrest, search and seizure developed through court decisions that impact and form the way police officers do their jobs. Discussion will also include the criminal and civil liability that result from improper acts and/or the failure to act on part of police.

Students will have an established knowledge of specific areas of the U.S. Constitution as it relates to specific legal liabilities of criminal justice professionals, in particular police officers. Students will gain the ability to identify, assess, and compare Constitutional protections and individual rights and recognize violations of those Rights. Additionally, students will have a workable knowledge of the most significant legal challenges to criminal justice policy and the resulting changes to those policies.

Criminal Justice Undergraduate Program Learning Objectives (PLOs)

- PLO 1.** Demonstrated knowledge of specific areas of the U.S. Constitution as it relates to specific legal liabilities of criminal justice professionals. The ability to identify, assess, and compare Constitutional protections and individual rights and recognize violations of those Rights. Workable knowledge of the most significant legal challenges to criminal justice policy and the resulting changes to those policies.
- PLO 2.** Demonstrate knowledge of Criminological theories, and apply those theories to practical criminal justice events. The ability to identifying a prominent criminological theory within an actual criminal event or simulated criminal event. The ability to compare and contrast the basic concepts of the differing competing Criminological Theories.
- PLO 3.** Working knowledge of the specific language of the Criminal Justice and the ability to identify the individual parts of the CJ System. An awareness of the costs associated with the Criminal Justice System, and the ability to recognize and be aware of political influence on the system. The ability to apply historical knowledge of the CJ system and recognize patterns of system change.

Requirements – Students will:

Grading:

Final Grades in this course will consist of student's performance on Discussion Questions (Total 45 pts), Tests - 5 tests covering 3 chapters each (Total 500 pts), and one current events summary (10 pts).

Tests will cover three chapters each and consist of 10 multiple choice questions per chapter for a total of 30 questions for each test. All tests must be completed on time, as there will be no make-up exams given. The Tentative Course Schedule provides the dates for these exams. The final exam will be available only during finals week and will cover the last three chapters only.

Discussion Questions:

Students will be expected to log in frequently, possibly several times each week, to actively participate in class discussions. Participation will involve responding to each discussion question as well as responding to information posted by other students. Students are required to participate and are expected contribute considerably to discussion boards. Students will need to draw on their own personal experiences, knowledge gained from reading the textbook, prior coursework, and any other source that would make a positive contribution to discussions. Each week there will be 1-2 discussion questions posted on Blackboard. The Discussion Question section will provide students with the guidelines for discussion content. All responses for discussion shall remain professional and courteous at all times.

Current Events Summary:

As this class will demonstrate, criminal procedure is continuously met with court challenges, changes, modifications and news-worthy incidents covered by news media. Students will be required to select one current event related to criminal procedure, summarize the event and main points associated with it, and post the summary to the discussion board. Each student will be required to comments on at least two of these posts.

Plagiarism:

Integrity is essential in the criminal justice field. Each student is expected and required to do their own work. Any cheating or plagiarism on any assignments in this class will result in a grade of "F".
