Course Description:

This course covers the application of investigative and evidentiary procedures to wildlife law enforcement; legal basis for wildlife laws; federal and state wildlife laws; roles of wildlife law enforcement in wildlife management. (SRSU Catalog)

Objectives:

Upon completion of this course, students should be able to understand the history and organization of the Criminal Justice System as related to wildlife law enforcement, the personal side of policing, wildlife law enforcement operations and processes, and current issues involved the in wildlife law enforcement.
