COURSE SYLLABUS

PURPOSE: This course explores the development of modern Spain from its beginnings in

prehistoric times to the present moment. The historical, cultural, political, and societal characteristics of Spanish people will be studied and discussed in detail.

OBJECTIVES: The student will:

- Show understanding of major historical and contemporary developments in Spain, including the individuals, groups, and events that shaped the development of Spain as a nation.
- Show understanding of the geographical features of Spain, and how regional geography influenced historical developments.
- Identify the major social, economic, and cultural features of Spain, as well as the significant features of daily life in contemporary Spain.
- Apply knowledge of Spanish art, literature, and music, including the major artists, writers, and musicians and the characteristics of their works as well as the major movements and periods in art, literature and music.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS FOR SPN 3314 ON THE WEB

Please Note:

If you do not have **reliable** access to a computer with a HIGH SPEED (DSL or Cable modem) internet connection several days a week you **should not** take this class. If you do not have a computer at home, you may use the computers in one of the Rio Grande College computer labs. Be advised that the RGC computer labs are only open Monday through Thursday from 8am to 9pm and Friday 8am to 5pm. There are also computers available at the various computer labs at Southwest Texas Junior College. Check with SWTJC for availability.

- 1. Now that you have successfully logged on to this course, please familiarize yourself with the information available on the system. Most everything you do will start by clicking on one of the buttons on the left side of the main course page. Feel free to experiment to familiarize yourself with the site. If you have trouble, click the "**Help**" button on the left side of the page.
- 2. Every time you log on, check for new announcements by clicking on the "Announcements" button. This is how I will communicate general information to the class. I recommend logging on several times a week just to be sure. If I need to communicate urgently, I will use the Message Center, so please check your messages daily. Remember, you must use ONLY the Blackboard Message Center to contact me regarding this course. I will not accept nor answer email for matters dealing with this course. You may use email to contact me about other matters not pertaining to this course.
- 3. Some of the course documents you will access in this course are in PDF format. The PDF format is used by Adobe Acrobat Reader which allows you to view and print out any document, independent of the word processing or image viewing software you are using. In order to view these documents, your computer must have Acrobat Reader installed on it. All the computers at SRSU-Rio Grande College already have this program installed. If you are using a computer at home that does not have the Acrobat Reader, you can download a free copy by going to http://www.adobe.com/products/acrobat/readstep2.html and following the instructions.
- 4. The basic format of this course is summarized here:
- a. Every week you will complete the reading for that week, and every two weeks you will take practice quizzes for selected chapters on the textbook author's website, http://civycultura.denison.edu/quizzes/index.html. After completing each quiz you will see a certificate of completion. Print that out for your records. Send me a copy by clicking on the mail icon under the certificate as shown in this image:



My email address is found on page one of the syllabus. The quiz assignments will be found under the "Assignments" tab in Blackboard. The questions on the practice quizzes are very similar to those that will appear on the exams.

- b. Additional materials, such as handouts, maps, photos, etc. will be posted in the section accessed by clicking the "Course Documents" button. The materials are organized by theme and book chapter. As you read a chapter, please click the appropriate link to find the additional information. These supplemental materials are to help you grasp the concepts presented in the text, but they will not be used to provide quiz or exam questions that cannot also be found in the text.
- c. The publisher of your textbook maintains a web page which presents textual and graphic material to supplement the readings. You can access the website at

http://wps.prenhall.com/wl_cantarino_civilizacion_5

Once you have logged on, you will see a list of the chapters by number at the top of the page. You can access the materials related to the chapter you are reading by clicking on the chapter number. When you choose your chapter, you will see a page with several selection buttons on the left side of the page that will lead you to valuable information related to the chapter topic.

- d. The exams in this course will be given on the dates and times indicated on the syllabus. The exams will be available **only** at those times. Once you begin taking the exam, you will have a limited amount of time to complete it. You **will** be able to restart the where you left off if you decide to stop before completing it, but the time limit clock will continue while you are offline, so do not waste time. Be sure to leave yourself enough time to complete the exam should you stop and restart it. If your internet connection drops off or if you experience another computer malfunction, you will need to notify me via the **Message Center** as soon as possible so I can research the problem. Since I cannot know if your home computer is reliable, I suggest using the computers in one of the Rio Grande College computing labs. Finally, **don't wait** until the last minute of the quiz period to begin your exam. **I will not give anyone another chance to complete the quiz after it becomes unavailable.**
