4. the ability work creatively with actors and technicians in mounting a laboratory theatrical production.

6. the ability to apply all approaches to theatrical design and rendering of the design
7. the ability to address all technical aspects of a theatrical production

Outcome Competencies:

The student will be able to:

- A. Describe the theatre process and compose a functional definition for the theatre event.
- B. Name the basic responsibilities and roles of the playwright, director, actor and designer in the theatre production.
- C. Have a basic understanding of the difference between tragedy, comedy, melodrama, farce, epic and absurdist theatre.
- D. Describe the uniqueness of the theatre art.
- E. Understand and describe the elements necessary to bring about a unified production.
- F. Identify a variety of theatre spaces.
- G. Know the names and works associated with key figures in the theatre.
- H. Demonstrate their understanding of acting, directing, playwriting or design in the areas of set, sound, or make-up.

Attendance Policy

Please type all papers.

1. Textbook

Students will be required to read assigned materials in the textbook and address the questions in the Power Points. This material will be the basis for discussion boards and quizzes/exams.

2. Biographical sketches of theatre personnel

You will write 4 to 5 biographical sketches on people in the theatre. This will be on playwrights, directors, designers and actors. The sketch will cover the person's achievements in a particular area of theatre. These sketches should be 1 ½ to 2 typed pages with at least 3 sources. Use standard 1" top and bottom margins, 1.25" left and right margins, and 12 point type. A cover page must contain the class name and number, your name and the number of the biographical sketch.

3. Write a scene

You will write a scene. This will be on a subject given to you by the instructor. This will be spoken language and not a narrative or story. The scene should be between a page to a page and half. You will be give a scene to read as an example.

4. Examinations

a. Quizzes and Exams

Covers readings, Power Points and discussions.

5. Critique

Students will write one – three to four pages, double spaced, typed critique of a theatre production you see or play you read. Use standard 1" top and bottom margins, 1.25" left and right margins, and 12-point type.

At the top of the page please place your name and date.

In your paper please answer the following questions:

1. What is the title and playwright's name for your play?
2. What genre or type of play did you see (i.e. comedy, tragedy, drama, musical, et al.)?
3. Describe the plot. What happens in the play? What is the problem and how was it resolved? Did you like the way the play progressed? Was there anything about the action that bothered you?
4. Choose one actor/character and describe their performance. Did they make you believe they were that character? Was their language consistent?
5. Describe how the actors as a group (ensemble) added or detracted from the "reality" of the performance.
6. What was the theme or moral of the story?
7. Describe how the visual (seen) and aural (sound) elements of the play (i.e. set, costumes, lights, sound) added or detracted from the performance. If you are reading a play what do you see as their set and costumes. Was there any information in the script that told you what the space should look like?
8. What did you like and dislike about the production. i.e. acting, story line, what the actors said, etc.

9. Would you recommend to a friend that they should see this play/ensemble performance? Why or why not?

There are no live theatre performances during the Summer II session. If you happened to see “Into the Woods” during Summer I session, then you can write a critique on that performance. If you did not see that performance then you can email me about a movie you can watch at home. I would like for it to be a play that has been turned into movie. For example “West Side Story”, “The Producers” or “The Glass Menagerie”. Some of these can be found online. On the last page there is a list of movie I found on Netflix, Project Free TV and YouTube.

Once you have written the critique please place in the appropriate Journal section then email me at jsawyer@sulross.edu to let me know you have turned in the assignment.
