REQUIRED MATERIALS

PLEASE NOTE: There is a different 7th edition available (and the book cover is almost identical), but students must order the **DSM-5 Update 7th edition** PACKAGE for this course!

The Package ISBN 9781259143670 includes the **Connect Plus Access Card**. This is an integral part of this course, and that code will allow you to access Faces Interactive videos you are required to view and answer quizzes based on their content. That access card is good for only one semester, so you cannot buy a used one from a previous student.

The hardcover text **with Connect Plus access card: ISBN- 9781259143670**

NOTE: If you purchase your textbook separately, and it doesn't have a Connect Plus Access Card, you will have to order a Connect access code standalone, so it might be easier to buy the package.

<http://shop.mcgraw-hill.com> Enter the ISBN 9781259143670 You will then see PK ABNRML PSYCH W/CNCT+ AC, 7th Edition ISBN-13 9781259143670 (That contains **both** the hard copy textbook **and** the Connect Plus Psychology 1 Semester Access Card.) The cost is \$208.99.

Alternatively, instead of buying the package all at once, you can purchase a textbook separately. After you access the publisher's website at <http://show.mcgraw-hill.com>, enter the ISBN 9781259133381. You will be able to select the *textbook only* for \$150. However, **you will still need to purchase the Connect Plus Access Card!** In order to purchase the standalone Connect Plus Access Card, go to http://connect.mcgraw-hill.com/class/t_olive_abnormal_psychology Register. After you enter, you will see on the right side of the screen a box that says: "Need a print copy of the textbook? Buy Connect and **SAVE** big on discounted loose-leaf version." Click on that blue word **SAVE**. That will take you to a Student Registration page. Under "Don't Have Code" on the right side of the screen, click on **Buy Online**. You will see **Connect Purchase**. You can purchase Connect access for \$40. This is a slightly less expensive option; it just requires more time on your

part. In other words, you can purchase the hard copy textbook for \$150, and the Connect access for \$40, for a total of \$190. This is a slight saving as compared to the \$208.99 to order them both at the same time. Note: you may see when you purchase the Connect access an option for Connect Plus Purchase. This is for the electronic book (not the hard copy) for \$105. We do **not** recommend this, because you may need the hard-copy textbook to refer to at a later time.

- American Psychiatric Association (2013). *Diagnostic and statistical manual of mental disorders, Fifth Edition: DSM-5*. Washington, DC: American Psychiatric Association. **This is required!** You should be able to readily find it through online textbook vendors such as Amazon for approximately \$85.

COURSE DESCRIPTION (Official catalog description)

This course examines existing concepts of mental illness and offers a healthier, client-freeing approach. Presentations on medications, stress and the immune system, mental status exam, and cases exemplifying diverse responses to human suffering are included.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Student will be able to:

- Recognize the signs and symptoms of mental illness, and other forms of psychological and behavioral dysfunction.
- Understand and use the *DSM-5* system for the classification and diagnosis of psychological disorders.
- Consider the complex factors that contribute to psychological and behavioral dysfunction, including biological, developmental, psychodynamic, and sociocultural issues.
- Demonstrate a general understanding of the common treatments of major classes of mental illness.

PROGRAM LEARNING OUTCOMES

- Students will demonstrate their ability to apply within guidance and counseling, their knowledge of human development, diversity, and factors that affect students'/clients' ability to achieve their potential.

You are expected to participate in the online activities and discussions. Your final course grade may be affected by both the quality and quantity of your participation. On the "Of Particular Interest" Discussion Board forums (2), you will be provided an opportunity to demonstrate your knowledge and to interact with others. If you post on the "Questions & Concerns" Discussion Board forum, your questions and responses should give evidence that you are keeping up with the assigned reading and examining all other students' postings. The "Student to Student" forum is optional. Note: Additional forums may be posted; if so, you will be instructed to interact on those forums. You are expected to read the "Important Information from Dr. Feldmann" and the "Questions & Concerns" Forums regularly, as that is how the instructor will communicate with the class throughout the semester! You are also required to check your Sul Ross email and to respond promptly to messages from the instructor.

ATTENDANCE POLICY

You are responsible for reviewing the university policies on Absences and Class Attendance in the SRSU Student Handbook. Students, in order for you to participate in this course, you must reply to an Online Participation Policy forum on the Discussion Board. It is policy at Sul Ross State University that if a student is enrolled in an online course and fails to stay active for a period of 3 weeks (one week during a summer session), fails to submit assignments, and/or does not reply to emails from the instructor, he/she will be dropped from the course with an "F." ASSIGNMENT DESCRIPTIONS

Reading Assignments. Two books are required for this class. You are expected to read the *Abnormal Psychology* text thoroughly. The *DSM-5* (DSM) should be read selectively and used as a reference. You must become very familiar with its use; you need not memorize all the details of every diagnosis. Reading assignments are listed in the **DUE DATES** below. Please complete the reading assignments and **study** the materials prior to submitting assignments.

Connect Faces Interactive Videos and Quizzes. This on-line program, accessed via the following URL: <http://connect.mcgraw-hill.com> presents videos and cases for twelve different psychological disorders. View the appropriate case when the disorder is covered in the text and submit the accompanying quiz (see the **DUE DATES** on the calendar in this syllabus for reading assignments and due dates). Students, you are required to access Connect at <http://connect.mcgraw-hill.com>

You will then see a page with a photo of the textbook, and to the right, blue letters stating "Click Here to Access Faces Interactive." After you click on that, you will see another screen with **Faces Interactive**. Click on that, and you will then see a list of 12 different disorders.

- * Select the disorder you want to view, and then select the **Diagnosis** tab and watch the video.
- * Then select the **Case History** tab and read the Case History, the Background Information, the Symptoms, the Impact on Daily Functioning, and the Treatment.
- * Then select the **Interview tab**. You will need to Select a Theme. There may be as many as 12 themes there. You will select a theme, and you will see a list of questions. Click on each question, and you will see the client answer on the video. There may be 5-6 questions under each Theme. Watch the video for each and every question, under every Theme. This will take some time, as there may be as many as 60 or more short video clips for each disorder. In other words, don't wait until the day the quiz is due to start watching the video!
- * Then click on the **Treatment** tab.

After you have finished this entire process, scroll down and **take the Quiz**. There will be 10 questions, and you can only take the quiz once. Each question is worth 10 points, so you can potentially earn a score of 100 on the quiz. NOTE: when you finish answering all 10 questions, scroll up to the top of the page and you will see a dark blue button that reads "submit assignment." When you're ready to submit, click that "**submit assignment**" button. (Do NOT Click on the "save and exit.")

There are 12 quizzes, one for each disorder. See the syllabus for the due dates for each quiz. Remember that no late assignments are accepted.

Case Report—Faces Interactive

Case Report--Choose **any one case** from the Connect--Faces Interactive program, and prepare a written case report according to the format given on the Assignment area on Blackboard. See specific instructions via the Assignments button on Blackboard regarding format and instructions for this document. The due date for this assignment is listed in the calendar in this syllabus. Late assignments are not accepted.

Sign in, and then click on **Faces Interactive**. Select the Disorder you want to use for your case study assignment. Watch all parts of the video, including the Diagnosis, Case Study, Interview (**click on all Themes, and ask each question under each of the themes so you can see the entire interview**), and Treatment. Then click on the Case History tab. You will see the case history typed below. Copy the Case History for the client. On the right, you will also see the Case Details (the Background Information, Symptoms, Impact on Daily Functioning, and Treatment). Open each one and copy to incorporate in your case report.

I am providing you a **sample case report** that you can use to format your own case history assignment. Because my example is based on the ADHD client video, **you cannot use ADHD for your case report**. You may select another disorder/video from the other 11 disorders listed on the Faces Interactive list (Bipolar Disorder, Borderline Personality Disorder, Bulimia Nervosa, Major Depressive Disorder, Obsessive-Compulsive Disorder, Panic Disorder with Agoraphobia, Persistent Depressive Disorder, Post-Traumatic Stress Disorder, Schizophrenia, Substance Abuse, or Tourette's Syndrome). Select only one of these for your case report.

You will need to view **all segments** of the video for your disorder, as well as **find the DSM-5 diagnostic coding information in the DSM-5 to complete the assignment**. You will need to locate your selected disorder in the *DSM-5* on pages 31-705 (use the Index at the back of the *DSM-5* to quickly find the disorder). Note: Find ICD-9CM V codes beginning on page 874 in the *DSM-5*.

Open the attachment on Blackboard on the Case Report Assignment (via the Assignment tab on Blackboard) to view the Sample Case Report, based on David, the Faces Interactive client with ADHD. **Exactly** follow the format and headings I have utilized. You must follow the format I've provided and include a References page, following correct APA style. Additional details may be found on the Blackboard course site.

DSM Diagnostics Assignment. You will be presented with **four** client cases described in the literature. You are then to "diagnose" or classify the condition that is occurring, and prepare a written report of your analysis for each case. Use the report format utilized in the example provided on the DSM Diagnostics assignment

instructions on the Assignments tab on Blackboard. Note the due date indicated below on this syllabus. Create one long Microsoft word document; begin a new page for each case, and center the case number at the top of that new page (Case #1; Case #2; Case #3; Case #4). You may submit this assignment any time **before** the due date; **late work will not be accepted.**

General Format for Written Work. Papers must be typed using **one-inch margins** (to adjust your page format, go to Page Layout or Page Setup on the File menu in Word), **Times New Roman 12-point type font**, and **double line spacing**, have **all pages including the first numbered**, and be **edited** for spelling and grammar. **NOTE: Proofread your work, and if needed, engage a trusted individual to assist in proofreading. Your writing reflects your professionalism. Papers with multiple errors will receive a reduction in grade.** Refer to Blackboard assignments for specific formatting directions and/or format examples for each assignment. APA style must be utilized correctly.

Exams. A midterm and a final exam will be given on Blackboard as noted in the **DUE DATES** below. 12 Faces Interactive quizzes will be given. You are responsible for **all** material posted online **and** reading assignments. No late exams will be accepted.

Discussion Board Forums. You are required to post a thread on the “Of Particular Interest” Forum #1 and “Of Particular Interest Forum #2, and make a response to another student on each of the forums. You are also required to “Introduce Yourself” and post an “Online Participation Policy” statement of agreement. Additional forums may be posted throughout the semester; in this instance, students will be informed and expected to respond. You are required to monitor the “Important Information from Dr. Feldmann” forum and the “Questions & Concerns” forum. The “Student-to-Student” forum is optional. Due dates are posted in the calendar in this syllabus.

CALENDAR / DUE DATES

The instructor reserves the right to amend the calendar. If this becomes necessary, all students will be notified. This is an online course and requires video support materials. It is the students’ responsibility to insure that their personal technology is adequate, and if a student is traveling, he/she must make provision to have computer access and submit assignments no later than the due date. LECTURES/DISCUSSIONS

Note: This course is delivered entirely online. Therefore, all lectures will be posted and available to students from the beginning of the semester, and discussion will occur in forum(s) on Blackboard at the designated times in this syllabus.

Lectures will incorporate text and power point presentations including the following topics: course overview; understanding abnormality: a look at history and research methods; classification and treatment plans; assessment; theoretical perspectives; anxiety disorders; somatoform disorders, psychological factors affecting medical conditions, and dissociative disorders; sexual disorders; mood disorders; schizophrenia and related disorders; personality disorders; development-related disorders; aging-related and cognitive disorders; substance-related disorders; eating disorders and impulse-control disorders; and ethical and legal issues.
