English 5308 Historical and Pedagogical Approaches to Grammar

Course Description

English 5308 is a reading and research-based course about English grammar. The course is designed for students with varying levels of linguistic competence; it will cater to a wide range of interests in the topic. The course will cover a history of grammar as well as pedagogical, linguistic, and philosophical approaches to grammar. We will explore and evaluate prescriptive school grammar, phrase-structure grammar, Chomsky's critique of phrase-structure grammar, and cognitive grammar. Students will conduct research to write a research paper and share their findings on Blackboard.

English Program Student Learning Outcomes

The graduating student in English will demonstrate that he/she can

- construct essays that demonstrate clear topic/thesis, development, organization, and appropriate language
- select, evaluate, and synthesize primary and secondary sources and correctly document those sources
- demonstrate knowledge of a variety of literature, of elements of literature, and of literary genres necessary for success in teaching or in graduate school.

English 5308 Student Learning Objectives

At the end of the course, students will be able to

1. identify different linguistic approaches to the study of grammar, including traditional grammar, phrase structure grammar and cognitive grammar (Measures: discussions, tests);
2. explain dialects including standard English (Measures: discussions, tests,);
3. apply grammar theories to teaching and preparing teaching materials for high school and college teaching (Measures: discussions, tests);
4. write a clear and theoretically correct research paper on the subject of grammar (Measures: researched essay).

Discussions**Your weekly discussions are due by 11:59 p.m. Fridays.**

Discussions (300 words approx.) provide opportunities for you to make sense of the week's readings through written conversations that closely connect to the text. Your purpose is to extend and deepen each other's understanding of the material in writing that is clear, succinct, and developed with illustrative textual references.

Your responses to each other (respond to at least two students) are due by 11:59 p.m. Mondays. Your responses (250 words) to each other should be similarly clear and well developed with textual references.

Researched Paper is due November 18 by 11:59 p.m.

The researched paper consists of three documents:

- A one-page proposal identifying question/problem, your approach to addressing it, and the value of your paper for your intended audience; this is due September 16 by 11:59 p.m.
- An annotated bibliography of at least ten sources; due October 7 by 11:59 p.m. For each source, provide a brief annotation that
 - describes the source's purpose,
 - outlines briefly its major ideas, and
 - evaluates its value for scholars and teachers.
- A 15 page researched paper for college-level scholars or instructors. An assignment handout will be provided.

The three tests will consist of short answer questions and essay questions. You will receive the details in announcements.
