Instructions – History 3310 will be an all on-line web-based internet class. Each student should have access to a computer either at home or at one of the RGC computer labs. Each student must make a commitment to keep pace with the course schedule. Students should be familiar with the course syllabus. Exams will be given only on-line. Students should arrange their schedules to make sure they complete all assignments and exams as they are offered. Students must complete all assignments to receive credit for the course. A total of 4 points for **each** missed assignment will be deducted from the student's total grade.

Excuses for missed exams will not be accepted. If a student misses an exam for "any reason", that student will be required to take the makeup exam in the Del Rio RGC computer lab at a scheduled time. It is highly recommended that students complete all exams in the RGC computer labs. All exams will be timed and if you are working from home and are inadvertently dropped from your connection, I will be required to re-open your exam. If that should happen, there will be a **deduction** of 3 points from your score. **All exams (there will be four) will have a 50 minute time limit. Students who exceed that time will have points deducted from their exam score. Deductions are as follows: 0-59 seconds -2 points; 1-2 minutes -4points; 2-3 minutes - 6 points; and so on.**

Each of these topics will be posted separately. Grades will be based on participation: your comments and your responses to other student's thoughts and comments. **Do not miss the discussions.**
