

History 5313: W01/ World War One

Summer One: 2017/Dr. Mark Saad Saka

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Course Objectives

The objective of this course is to examine the history of the First World War; a War that the United States entered into one hundred years ago this year (1917), even though it had of course been waging since the Summer of 1914. We will examine the origins of the war, the course, and just as important but oftentimes neglected; its' aftermath which unfolded through the early 1920s. In addition, we will examine the First World War outside of traditional Europe and examine its impact on the Ottoman Empire and the making of the modern Middle East. As you are aware, the United is today militarily involved in Afghanistan, Iraq, and Syria and the origins of these conflicts are rooted in the First World War and its aftermath.

Each chapter review should be one to two pages, double-spaced, 12 font. Since these are book reviews, a bibliography page is not required, but just note the page reference.
2. You must write a ten-page research paper on a topic that covers something, someone, or an event during the First World War. The topic must be approved by me. I want you to pick a topic that you like and feel passionate about. I have found that if you enjoy your topic, you write much better and learn more. I prefer one either MLA or Chicago Style for notes and bibliography.

3. You must maintain regular email contact with me. I have found that the problem with online classes is lack of student communication with their professor. I check and reply to email quite regularly, but if I do not hear from you for ten days??? What am I supposed to think???
