Program Overview

Master of Education General with Specialization Program

This is a 30-hours graduate program leading to a Master of Education degree in a specialization of the student's choice. The program provides students with a comprehensive and life changing education to expand their content knowledge cultural awareness, creativity, and service. The program is online, so students have flexibility to select courses that meet their individual schedules

The Master of Education degree is designed for students who wish to acquire a solid foundation in the practical and theoretical aspects of education, considering past and contemporary issues. Students who complete the program will acquire professional knowledge, conceptual understanding, and instructional applications to enable them to assume leadership positions improving the overall quality of education in their selected areas of specialization and deepening their knowledge of this important field of study. Interdepartmental collaboration among graduate students, Education Department faculty, and other department professors, in the students' selected areas of specialization, enrich students' experiences. SRSU offers a unique approach to degree plan development through consultations among graduate students and department advisors. Graduate students tailor their own degree plans to best meet their interests and needs.

The degree leads to a variety of opportunities including:

- Eligibility to teach dual-credit courses in high schools (with existing educator certificate).
- School or district level leadership positions.
- Eligibility to teach courses at community colleges.
- Professional and personal readings and research in the field of education.
- Preparation for doctoral work in university graduate programs.

Certificate Options

Once admitted to the Master of Education General program, graduate students meet with the program advisor to create a plan that is unique to meet their needs. Certificate options are offered.

- Certificate in Content Specialization (for due credit teachers) –18 hours
- Certificate in Dual Credit Advanced Pedagogy—21 hours

Marketable Skills

These skills are more global in nature and would have application in any professional setting.

1. Students will develop writing skills for effective communication.

- 2. Students will develop research skills to promote life-long learning.
- 3. Students will demonstrate an understanding of diversity.

Student Learning Outcomes

As a member of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools Commission on Colleges (SACSCOC), Sul Ross State University requires that all degree programs include Student Learning Outcomes (SLO). The SLO's are more academic and infused in all of the courses. The assessments for the SLO's are embedded in designated courses.

- 1. Students will demonstrate writing skills and the ability to use research methodology to design a research proposal (measured in EDUA 5307).
- 2. Students will interpret diversity practices in society (measured in EDUA 5316).
- 3. Students will demonstrate their understanding of content in their chosen area of specialization (measured in Comprehensive Exam).

Admissions

There is a two-tiered admission process.

Tier One: Application

• The program coordinator will schedule a conference with each candidate (in-person or virtual) to discuss career goals and chosen discipline for specialization.

Probationary Admission

Although a 3.0 GPA or higher in the Bachelor's Degree is required for full admission, the MED General degree does accept students into the program with a lower GPA on a probationary basis. However, to earn the Master of Education degree, all students must achieve and maintain a 3.0 GPA or higher in their graduate studies.

Program Transfers

To transfer from the MED General to a MED with TEA certification, the student must reapply through Apply Texas. However, the student may avoid paying the fee a second time by selecting the option, "pay by check" and then completing the application. Students admitted on probation may transfer to a MED with TEA certification after completing 12 credits with a 3.0 GPA or higher. Students may be able to transfer credits from their MED General program to the new program, if they are the same or could be substitutions. Substitutions would be determined by the Program Coordinator of the new program.

Program Requirements

Attendance

Courses are online, and it is important to adhere to the attendance policy for online courses in the M.Ed. General Program. The university online attendance policy is addressed below:

- You are expected to login to Blackboard several times each week. The
 University policy for attendance in web-delivered courses states that
 non-participation (not logging in) for more than 3 weeks in a long
 session, or for 1 week during a summer session, may result in the
 student being dropped from the course by the professor.
- Policies in effect for on-campus, traditional classroom instruction courses also apply to students enrolled in distance education courses, including Web-based and Zoom courses. The University allows a maximum of 20% absences in a course before an instructor may drop a student for excessive absences.
- In Web courses, this policy is interpreted as not participating for more than 3 weeks in a long semester or 1 week in a summer session.
- Any student dropped for non-participation will receive an F in the course dropped. Inactivity may include the following:
 - not logging on to the course
 - not submitting assignments
 - not participating in scheduled activities
 - not communicating with the instructor by phone or email

 - not following the instructor's participation guidelines stated in the syllabus

Excessive absences could be grounds for a reduced grade and possible dismissal from the course.

Course Requirements

The Master of Education General Program offers students the opportunity to customize their degrees. The entire program is delivered online to increase accessibility for students. Graduate students enroll in 12 credit hours of core courses in education and then select 18 credit hours in a specialization area of their choice.

The following courses are required for a Master of Education General with Specialization.

Core Education Component (12 Semester Credit Hours)

• EDUA 6308 Advanced Human Growth and Development (3-0). A study of the human life span from conception to death, with emphasis on childhood and adolescence, and the implications for effective academic and interpersonal experiences.

OR

EDUA 5362 Innovative Teaching and Theory (3-0). This web course explores instructional strategies and methods to highly engage students in the college classroom. The course will introduce a variety of strategies to support teachers seeking to transform their classrooms to promote learning for all students. The focus is on student-centered instruction. Projects will be assigned in class to integrate theory and practice.

- EDUA 5316 Multicultural Perspectives in Education (3-0). A study of theory, research, and methodology relative to the needs of multicultural and special student populations.
- EDUA 5307 Graduate Research (3-0). A course designed to broaden the perspectives of graduate students and to introduce them to the techniques of research and the various fields of graduate work offered on this campus. Must be completed in first 12 sch.
- EDUA 5317 History, Philosophy, and Trends in Education (3-0). This course is a survey of the historical, philosophical and contemporary landscape of schools in the United States. Emphasis is placed on enduring debates about the purposes of education in a democratic society.

Specialization Component (18 Semester Credit Hours)

Students choose these courses in consultation with their advisors.

Customized Specialization

Since the courses in the specialization vary per student, they may be taken during any of the terms the courses are offered. Depending upon how many specialization courses are added each term, a student may be able to graduate within one year. However, a student does have the latitude to take up to six years to complete the degree.

Dual Credit Specialization

Students who already have a teaching credential may select the 18 credits in the discipline they will be teaching.

Graduation

Students will apply for graduation one semester before the anticipated date. Before you can graduate, an audit of your records is performed by the Registrar's office to determine if all requirements for your degree are met. This process does not begin without an application to graduate. This application must be submitted even if you do not intend to participate in a ceremony. Students must complete the application and submit the application to the registrar's office and pay the appropriate fees. The application is found at https://www.sulross.edu/registrar/graduation/

Comprehensive Examination

All students are required to pass a comprehensive exam that is administered during the last semester of the course work. The exam consists of four essay questions with two addressing the four required courses and two addressing the six courses in the specialization. The

questions are developed and graded by the faculty who teach the respective courses. All faculty use the same scoring rubric to evaluate a student's response and indicate if the student's response is failing, proficient, or exemplary. Students are given the scoring rubric in advance, so they understand how they will be evaluated. To earn exemplary, students must receive that overall rating on each of the four questions. If students do not receive an overall rating of proficient on each of the four essay questions, they will be given an additional testing opportunity. Each comprehensive exam will be different depending upon the area of specialization that the student selected and the faculty who taught the courses and wrote the exam questions.

Your participation in the Comprehensive Final Exam is an important step in completing your journey in earning a degree. You have the opportunity to show the faculty what you have learned during your time here at Sul Ross State University. You also will be confirming to yourself, that the learning experiences you have engaged in are meaningful and worthwhile to your growth as a professional. While the examination will challenge your thinking and your ability to communicate, we are confident that you will be successful.

Per university policy, you must be enrolled in one or more courses your last semester in order to take the comprehensive exam. If you have completed all required course work for the degree, there is a one credit course (EDUA 6040 Graduate Studies in Education) that is available to comply with university policy.

GENERAL DIRECTIONS:

The examination is a take-home and open-book exam, and students have five days to complete the exam. When you begin the exam, read each question carefully. Pause and reflect on what each question is asking. Then, answer each question as completely as possible. Make sure you type the question prompt and then begin typing your response. You are expected to support your response to each question using the course textbook(s) or research-based articles using APA format. Make sure to include a reference page.

FORMAT:

Complete the Exam in MS Word. Use Times New Roman Font and 12-point font size and line spacing is set at "double". Include page numbers, a title page, and a reference page. However, the title page and reference page are not included in the total page count. Make each question and response a separate document.

SCORING RUBRIC: The Comprehensive Exam Scoring Rubric is on the next page. It was revised in June 2025 by a committee of professors who teach the graduate level courses.

Student Information

Instruction for this program occurs primarily online between the instructors and the students through Blackboard.

 Online students are subject to the same university policies and procedures applicable to students attending face-to-face courses on campus.

- The course syllabus is available on Blackboard. This document describes the course content, goals, assignments, due dates, and student expectations. Criteria for success for online students is as rigorous and comprehensive as those used in face-to-face courses.
- Communication between instructor and student occurs through Blackboard and/or SRSU email. Students can expect to receive feedback for their assignments within five working days and responses to their emails within 48 hours.

- Attendance policies in effect for face-to-face instruction also apply to online students.
 This policy is interpreted as not participating for more than three weeks in a long

- Academic integrity is crucial for online instruction. To ensure academic integrity, online students are expected to honestly identify themselves. If Al-generated content is approved by the instructor to use, it must be cited in APA format; reference the organization behind the AI, include the year of the version used, and provide a link to the source.
- The program is designed to accommodate working schedules.
- The program is designed so that it may be completed in one year (with some exceptions in specialization courses)

Education Honor Society Kappa Delta Pi: Graduate students may also be invited to join Kappa Delta Pi, an international honor society for education majors. Eligibility is based on a GPA of 3.5 or higher and a student's commitment to the field of education. Students become members of Kappa Delta Pi and the local SRSU Chapter, Zeta Delta. Initiation ceremonies are scheduled at the end of each semester.
