The introductory question and the student café are not graded; however occurrences in these areas will result in 20 points per occurrence being subtracted from the overall Discussion Question grade – just like getting a 0 on one of the graded questions.

Course Objectives: Specific topic coverage includes the following (time permitting):

2. Examine legal implications of changing criminal behaviors in the area of cybercrime.
3. Particular attention will be paid to privacy issues, responses to various cybercrimes, and transnational issues such as cyber espionage and human trafficking.

General APA Guidelines

Your paper should have 3 parts the cover sheet, the paper, and the Reference page.

- The title page should have the assignment number and name.
- Your name is on the next line.
- The third line is the course number and name.

Your essay should be typed and double-spaced on standard-sized paper (8.5" x 11"), with 1" margins on all sides.

You should use a clear font that is highly readable. APA recommends using 12 pt. Times New Roman font.

Include a **page header** (also known as the "**running head**") at the top of every page.

- To create a **page header/running head**, insert page numbers flush **right**.
- Then type "TITLE OF YOUR PAPER" in the header **flush left** using all capital letters.
- The **running head** is a shortened version of your paper's title and cannot exceed 50 characters including spacing and punctuation.

APA format is the style all papers will be written in **do not** do the following:

Make up your format for the paper

Use MLA

Make up your own way for providing the format.
