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Course Objectives

The objective of this course is to examine the history of Europe during the age of the Reformation/Renaissance. This is a concise and accelerated mid-winter course. At the end of this course, the student should be familiar with the major events and issues concerning this critical age of European history.

Course Requirements

The requirements for this course is as follows:

1. Obtain the book.
2. Read the chapters and sections and write a three-page review for each day. Turn the written review in through Blackboard.
3. Write a research paper on a topic associated with the Reformation, the Counterreformation, or the Renaissance. I must approve the topic by June 26, -at the latest; preferably before
4. The paper should be ten pages for undergraduate students and eighteen pages for graduate student students. The papers should adhere to the MLA or Chicago manual for notes and format.
5. The papers are due by July 3 at midnight—at the latest.
6. Grade Structure—each chapter and daily review is graded as such—90-100=A; 80-89=B; 70-79=C; 60-69=D; 0-59=F—there are nineteen chapters and one conclusion for a possible 2000 points

The final paper is worth 1000 points
