**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course will provide a thorough examination of the American criminal justice system by providing an overview of the history, philosophy, and contemporary functions of the separate institutions which contribute to the process. The police, courts, corrections, and juvenile justice systems will be examined in order to develop an understanding of their contributions, assumptions, and interrelations.

**By the end of this course, you will be able to:**

- 1) Explain the fundamental principles that have shaped how the institutions of our criminal justice system operate in the U.S.;
- 2) Use historical references to explain the creation of the relationships between the institutions which form our justice system country;
- 3) Develop an understanding of the critical role occupied by these institutions within the U.S. criminal justice system and how the various subsets of our population relate to the different institutions;
- 4) Apply critical thinking and analytical reasoning to contemporary issues surrounding the state of the evolving criminal justice system of the U.S.

**COURSE NOTES**

Being that this is a web-based course, the course will be dependent on the class blackboard page. All course communication and instruction will take place through blackboard and the student's registered Sul Ross email address. Assignments/instruction will be posted on a weekly basis, and unless instructed otherwise, all weekly assignments will be submitted by the specified due date utilizing the appropriate web-based assets on the class blackboard site. Please check the course blackboard site frequently for additional required material, updates,

and the like. Additionally, although this is an online course, I am currently looking into the possibility of adding an online lecture component (i.e. Zoom or Google Duo based) which will greatly increase the learning process and assist in the accomplishment of the goals of the course. ### ***Grading Policy***

The final grades for the course will be determined based on the compilation of the following components:

- “Weekly” assignments/quizzes - over the life of the course, there will be numerous assignment/quiz grades, which will be averaged together and constitute 50% of your final grade
- Midterm Exam - to be held on **Wednesday, October 13, 2021 from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.** - will constitute 25% of your final grade
- Final Exam – to be held on **Monday, December 6, 2021 from 6:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m.** (25% of final grade)

- It should go without saying, but the past dictates that I stress to all students how important it is to complete **ALL** of the assignments and the exams. **Do not expect to do well in this course otherwise.**
- Final grades will be determined by obtaining the average of the weekly assignments/quiz grades and multiplying by .50, and multiplying the Midterm and Final exam grades each by .25. The three percentages are then added together to determine the final numerical grade.
