CATALOG DESCRIPTION:

ED 0300 Reading Review This course is designed for students whose score on an approved assessment instrument does not meet minimum requirements on the reading portion of the assessment. In this course, students will develop reading and study skills. Topics included in this course are defining vocabulary in context; identifying stated, implied main ideas and central point; identifying details that support and differentiate between fact or fiction; identifying author's purpose and tone; determining points and support of a critical argument. This course will emphasize correction of reading problems identified through diagnosis. Credit in this course cannot be used to satisfy requirements for any degree.

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:

After completing this course, the student should be able to demonstrate competency in the following:

- 1.0 Defining vocabulary using context clues
- 2.0 Identifying stated main idea, implied main idea, and central idea
- 3.0 Identifying details that support, illustrate, or elaborate
- 4.0 Recognizing relationships among ideas in written material
- 5.0 Differentiating between fact and opinion
- 6.0 Identifying author's purpose and tone
- 7.0 Determining points and support of a critical argument

METHOD OF EVALUATION: This is a Pass or Fail course. At the end of the seminar, you will be given a forty-question exam. You must score at least a seventy or better to pass the review.
