Course Description: This course offers an in-depth analysis of several Mexican literary pieces. We will explore cultural and ontological matters as guiding principles of the novels.

Course Objectives:

1. Understand the foundational role that Mexican novels from the revolutionary period have played.
2. Reflect on the importance of literary criticism.
3. Provide opportunities for literary research.
4. Practice individual oral presentations in Spanish.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- SLO 1. Students will identify ontological and philosophical problems within the novels.
SLO 2. Students will recognize a variety of cultural references.
SLO 3. Students will differentiate standard educated Spanish from dialectal variants.

Required text: Texts: All readings will be done from Open Educational Resources when available. Readings and sources are indicated below.

Other Requirements: Spanish/English Dictionary, Spanish-Spanish Dictionary.
Notebook.

Language requirements: This course will be **delivered entirely in Spanish**. All assignments and readings are to be done in Spanish without the use of any automatic/electronic translator.

Reading: This course is worth 3 credits, therefore, you are expected to read in Spanish at least 6 hours per week.
