Course Description

This course is class instruction for music majors and minors who have not had previous study, and for other interested students. Emphasis is on the ability to play and compose for the instruments studied: flute, oboe, clarinet, bassoon, and saxophone.

Student Learning Outcomes for Music Majors:

SLO 1: All students will demonstrate the ability to integrate appropriate musical expression into performance.

SLO 2: All students will demonstrate the ability to research and prepare appropriate program notes.

SLO 3: All students will demonstrate the ability to evaluate and critique a musical performance.

This course contributes to meeting these cumulative SLOs.

Student Learning Objectives (SLOs)

After completing this course, students should be able to:

- 1) Use basic terminology to describe the parts of all of the woodwind instruments covered as well as the most common function of each instrument in ensembles. (Knowledge)
- 2) Play basic songs or pieces on each of the instruments. (Skills, Attitudes or dispositions)
- 3) Demonstrate a broad knowledge of the pedagogy available for each instrument. (*Knowledge, Skills, Attitudes or dispositions*)
- 4) Teach the fundamentals of flute, clarinet, oboe, bassoon, and saxophone to beginning level students. (Skills, Attitudes or dispositions)
- 5) Demonstrate basic understanding of the construction and repair of common issues for woodwind instruments and reeds. (Skills, Attitudes or dispositions)

Major Assignments with Matched SLOs

- Students will complete four playing tests during the semester, one for each instrument covered in the course, and double reeds together. (1,2)
- Students will complete three written tests on the instruments studied. Material will include textbook information, class notes, and any additional information provided by the instructor in class. (1,3,5)
- Two writing assignments will be assigned during the course. One will be a journal article review about woodwind instruments (or one specific woodwind instrument) OR woodwind pedagogy. The second writing assignment will be a concert report of a woodwind recital. (1,3,5)
- The final project for the course will give the students an opportunity to construct a lesson plan and then teach another student that lesson on a woodwind instrument of their choice. (4)

Marketable Skills

The music student graduating with a BM in music (instrumental or vocal performance; instrumental or vocal education; or music business) should have the following Marketable Skills:

- 4. Experience using problem solving skills and abstract thinking to analyze compositions and examine their aesthetic through musical and extra-musical concepts, such as historical context and text setting.
- 5. Ability to create and disseminate basic marketing and public relations materials, as well as resumes, websites, and digital portfolios.
