### **Course Objective:**

This course gives students an in-depth study and discussion of Art History Styles and Movements from the Prehistory to Early 1400s. This course will provide information of a practical and historical nature emphasizing the aesthetic values and cultural contexts of various works of art during that time. Students will gain understanding of the fine arts with an emphasis of the history, styles, movements and the necessary vocabulary of the methods, practices to easily discuss, evaluate, and critique work in the Fine Arts from approx.: Prehistory through the 1400 Renaissance.

Starting with Precursors to our prehistory and ending in1400 Renaissance. Students will study the arts and their history to learn about our own creative expressions and those of our past. Studying the history of art is one way of exploring human cultures

1. Students will become aware of the vocabulary utilized to discuss and describe art and apply vocabulary in class/group discussions.

- 2. Students will learn Art Styles and Movements from Prehistory to 1400s.
- 3. Students will be introduced to the tools and techniques of making art during that time.
- 4. Students will learn painting, sculpture and architecture
- 5. Students will gain an awareness of art history.
- 6. Students will develop critical thinking skills through the examination of individual works of art.
- 7. Students will be able to synthesize, describe, and place works of art into social and historical contexts.
- 8. Students will learn to develop and express ideas clearly, consider the effects of meaning and message, as well as other communication skills by working together in groups, creating presentations, and detailed formal essays.
- 9. Students will develop teamwork skills by working together.
- 10. Students will develop an appreciation for the visual arts, crafts, and the human imagination.
- 11. Students will develop personal and social responsibility through management of individual and group requirements within the course, as well through examples of personal and social justice inherent in the history of art throughout the world.

Paragraph 4: Legacy

### **Power Point Presentations:**
