Instructor's Course Description

This is a creative writing class in poetry. Poems will be workshopped to hone the technical craft of poetry and offer a support group to one another as writers. The course will cover the formal aspects of poetry: sound, line, verse forms, voice, and imagery. At the same time that we are writing, we will read poets who can serve as models for our own work. We will also cover strategies for creativity and what it is to lead the life of a writer. Students will develop a portfolio of poetry and we will each endeavor to publish some of our writing.

DEPARTMENTAL ENG 5309 STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES (SLOS):

The student will be able to...

- 1. Understand the formal aspects of poetry, from meter to line patterns, sound patterns and figurative language.
- 2. Read, discuss, and respond critically to exemplary poetry.
- 3. Develop a portfolio of work and prepare for publication.
- 4. Develop skills in workshopping and editing the work of others and therefore also one's own work.

English Program Learning Objectives:

Graduating students will demonstrate that they can

- 1. Construct essays that demonstrate unity, organization, coherence, and development
- 2. Analyze literary works by applying principles of literary criticism or theory
- 3. Produce research papers that demonstrate the ability to locate a variety of acceptable sources, employ them effectively through quotations or paraphrases, integrate them smoothly into the writer's own prose, and document them correctly using MLA format
- 4. Demonstrate creativity or originality of thought in written or multimedia projects
- 5. Compare/contrast and analyze major works and periods within World, English, and American literature.

Projects

A. Discussion Board on Class Poems (200 points)

Each student will upload two original poems five times through the semester. Students will be organized into teams of three. A student's two partners will have the responsibility of introducing the poems, explaining the form and commenting on its strengths and weaknesses. Their job is to both commend the poems and also to raise questions that will help the poet revise and improve the poem. The remaining three students will then contribute their feedback and make suggestions for improvement. Submissions will take place every three weeks. The schedule will be staggered, so that every week one or two students will submit their work. There will be a midterm and an end-of-term grade for the quality and quantity of one's posts on the discussion board.

B. Discussion Board on Readings (200 points)

There will be weekly readings from our anthology The Ecco Anthology of International Poetry. These poems, as well as the poems in Mary Oliver's A Poetry Handbook, will serve as models for our own creative work. We will post on the form, context, and meaning of the assigned readings on the anthology. Midterm and end-of-term grades will be assigned for the Discussion Board on readings.

C. Portfolio (600 points total; 200 at midterm, 400 end of term)

Students will be submitted 10 poems across the semester on the discussion board. A portfolio with four (4) poems, introduced with a cover letter, will be submitted at midterm. At the end of the term, a final portfolio, with a cover letter and eight (8) poems will be submitted. I would like to have conferences with individual students to discuss their portfolios at midterm and at the end of the term.

D. Poetry Reading

At the end of the course, we will hold a reading with Dr. Sager's undergraduate class in poetry. The Reading could be a part of the SR Research Symposium.
