Purpose of the Course: A course to provide knowledge and application of basic, clinical, and applied research in kinesiology settings. Particular emphasis is given to understanding the body of work on a topic, experimental design, and the research process. Students are given opportunities to design, conduct and/or participate in a research project related to kinesiology.

Course Description: In this course, students are introduced to the basic concepts and techniques that are used in scientific research. The course is divided into three sections: 1) scientific inquiry and research design, 2) quantitative and qualitative data gathering and analysis, 3) results, discussion, conclusion and publication.

Student Learning Outcomes:

- 1. Demonstrate understanding of the basic principles and procedures of research methodology through projects and written assignments.
- 2. Critically evaluate both quantitative and qualitative research studies by conducting a literature review on a topic of interest to the student.
- 3. Define, give the significance of, and use key concepts in research ethics as they apply to research design by creating and evaluating a proposed research study with informed consent documentation.
- 4. Evaluate and apply appropriate research methodology by creating a research design for a specific research project of their own choice.
- 5. Write a complete research article or create a research presentation and seek out publication or presentation opportunities.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS (include an explanation of the work the students will do)

I. Research Quizzes x 4

Students will be presented with a reading assignment related to the topic and will take a short quiz over the content.

- a. What is research
- b. Data gathering & analysis
- c. APA format
- d. Results, conclusions and publications

II. CITI Training

The Collaborative IRB Training Initiative (CITI) is an educational program for the protection of human subjects in research. The program involves the certification of faculty and students in general research and ethics for working with human subjects. All Key Research Personnel must complete the online CITI Training Program prior to IRB approval of a new or continuing review application. The CITI program is a self-paced course that covers the historical development of human subject protections, as well as current information on regulatory and ethical issues. The certification is good for three years. Please go into the CITI site to register and learn more about the program.

III. Learning to Read Research x 3

Students will be tasked with located journals and articles related to assigned topics and putting them into a matrix for easy reference during the research paper writing process.

- a. Kinesiology Journals find 5 journals that are relevant to the research topics of the class and could be potential journals for article submission of the final project.
- b. Article Search #1 find 5 articles related to any topic of interest to you
- c. Article Search #2 find 10 articles related to the class research topic

IV. IRB Submission

Work together with a partner to complete the IRB document for submission to the Sul Ross IRB committee for review and approval. This will include designing the research methods.

V. Research Papers x 2

- a. Paper #1 Students will use the literature matrix to write up an introduction to the topic and a literature review of the related articles and past/recent research.
- b. Paper #2 Students will take the data gathered from campus research and perform data analysis procedures to get research results. The results will be used to determine the research conclusion and written up in paper format.

VI. Final Research Project x 1

Students will compile all previous work to create a final project. Students will be allowed to choose one of two format options:

- a. Written Article & Journal Submission
- b. PPT or Poster Presentation & Conference Application
