COURSE DESCRIPTION

ALL COURSE REQUIREMENTS DEADLINE

Due to the time requirement for grading purposes, all course requirements must be submitted/completed by the 'Course Requirements Deadline' of Wednesday of Week 8 at 11:59pm to be counted for credit towards the final letter grade in this course. <u>INTRODUCTION/BIOGRAPHY (50 points)</u>
You are required to submit a statement that you have read and understood the Course Syllabus. This assignment must be completed before you submit any gradable items.

- Introduction (Syllabus Statement) After reading the syllabus, you will take a one question survey to confirm that you have read and understood the course syllabus for Leadership in Sport Administration.
- Biography This discussion forum allows you to introduce yourself through a short biography or personal statement. You should take advantage of this ability to meet and greet your instructor and fellow students. Read and Reply to at least 2 students. Your biography is worth 30 points and each reply to classmates 10 points, totaling 50 points.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS (300 total points)

At the beginning of each unit, choose a discussion question from the two chapters covered. You will restate the question first, then you will write your answer. Answers must be at least 800 words in depth, which is due Wednesday at 11:59 pm. Students then must respond to two classmate's discussion questions. These responses must be academic and scholarly in nature, a minimum of 300 words, and are due by Friday at 11:59 am. When breaking down the point total for each discussion question, 30 points is given for answering your discussion question and 10 points for each academic response, totaling 50 points. A total of 6 discussion questions and responses are worth 300 total points, which makes up much of your grade. To earn all the points possible, answer all discussion questions, do good work, submit your response on time, and respond to two other student's discussions.

WEEKLY TESTS (250 total points)
There are 10 different chapters, distributed into five different units. Each unit concludes with a 50-point quiz that focuses on the material from 2 chapters, so there are a total of 5 quizzes in the course worth 250 total points. There will be 1 Test due a week. The 5 quizzes will be taken and submitted online. Chapter tests will close at 11:59 pm every Sunday. If you are in the middle of taking a quiz when it closes after the due date, you will receive a zero, so plan accordingly. Also, you only get one attempt for each chapter quiz. Tests include multiple-choice questions. Once you start a test, you will have unlimited time to complete 20 questions, worth 2.5 points each. The questions are automatically scored after you take the quiz and are available after quiz completion.

Computer Problems During Quiz: Any problem that causes your quiz to close, submit with an error, or shutoff/disappear must be immediately reported to me. Otherwise, your actions can constitute academic dishonesty.

Helpful Tips: Since the Chapter Quizzes are an important part of your final grade, here are some helpful tips.

- 1. Set a schedule
- 2. Read the entire chapter, do not skim
- 3. Take notes and/or highlight
- 4. Review the notes, re-read if necessary
- 5. Take the quiz.

FINAL EXAM (150 total points)

The final exam will cover Chapters 1-10. The test will consist of 50 multiple-choice questions worth 3 points each, which total of 150 total points. Once you start the final exam, you will have unlimited time to finish. The etextbook and any notes that were taken while reading the chapters will be helpful while taking the final exam online.

LEADERSHIP BOOK REPORT (150 total points)

Choose a leadership book and have it approved by Dr. Morrissey. You will write a 5-page summary of this book in APA format.

LEADERSHIP PRESENTATION (150 total points)

You will create a presentation about the leadership book you chose to read for the other students in the class. Presentations will be via recorded presentation (Microsoft Teams, Kaltura Capture, Screencastify, Zoom, YouTube, etc. for the final week of the 8-week semester.
