#### **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

Addresses such questions as: What is mind? What is thinking? Memory? Learning? Perception? Identity?

Late discussions will earn a (0). Discussions will also receive partial grading of (5) points if any texting language is used such as using (i) instead of (I). Responses are to be at *least 4 full* sentences, anything less will result is 5 point deduction. Mid-Term – One (1) exam will be given at the end of this term.
