SYLLABUS

Course Introduction: This course gives students a hands-on approach to Stage makeup. Applying makeup to the face with an emphasis on tools, techniques, and Theatrical Character development regarding their appearance. Makeup application for a live audience is quite different than for a camera. Contrast is exaggerated to make features and facial expressions visible for audience members that are sitting far from the stage. Students learn application for different sized theatres as well as products that hold up through sweat and hot lights. Mood and character makeups are learned, as well as old age makeup for the stage. Color theory is reviewed, and makeup colors are created and applied from primes. Wig knowledge is necessary for theatre makeup artists. Applying, securing, and caring for different types of wigs are also covered, and we will explore Make Up applications for Fashion and Photography.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Learning Outcomes facilitated Stage Make Up Are:

- 1. Students will become aware ability to apply make up to themselves and to others.
- 2. Students will be introduced to the products and techniques of Stage makeup.
- 3. Students will be introduced to the tools and techniques of stage make up.

- 4. Students will utilize these processes to their own looks and to Characters of the Stage/Film and Television.
- 5. Students will develop critical thinking skills through the examination of individual roles and the necessary techniques to achieve a role look.
- 6. Students will learn basic cleansing and moisturizing techniques for the skin.
- 7. Students will learn to apply makeup and create character looks on a partner in the classroom.
- 8. Students will develop teamwork skills by working together in groups on assigned tasks will be encouraged to work together outside of class.
- 9. Students will develop an appreciation for the techniques and application of Stage Makeup and the art form as well the History of Makeup use and tools.

Textbook and Materials for the class:

- *There will be a textbook for this course and will be provided for you. Bobby Brown's make up Manual, For everyone from Beginner to Pro.
- *Notebook for taking notes and proper note taking utensils if necessary.
- * an Old T-shirt/sweatshirt or dressing robe with a wide neck to be worn during makeup application days.
- *camera, phone for picture taking assignments and the ability to print photographs in color
- *a wash cloth, a hand towel and a bath towel. (can be old and worn)
- *a Three ring binder/or portfolio for 8 1/2 " x 11" photograph printouts.
- *Class room discussions will be conducted in each class. Be prepared to participate in class discussions.

Evaluation:

You will be graded on participation in class discussion and group discussions, Mainly: Makeup application to yourself and your partner. 3 classes missed=automatic C. 4 Classes missed=Failure with no exceptions. You must attend the class for grades.

*all make up applications outside of the classroom will be considered as Extra Credit and will be given points as the nature of the application and relationship to class assignments.
