CATALOG DESCRIPTION: ENG 03090 Writing Skills (3-0). This course is designed for students whose score on an approved assessment instrument does not meet minimum requirements on the writing and/or reading portion of the assessment. Students will develop their writing and reading skills through exposure to writing and reading exercises. Topics include grammar, sentence structure, paragraph development, main ideas, supporting details, vocabulary, purpose, and tone. Credit in this course cannot be used to satisfy requirements for any degree.

- 1. Your registration in this course is the result of *your* test scores and, at this time, those scores do not indicate that you could be successful in an intensive writing college level class. We want you to be successful in your college-level courses, so learn everything that you can in this class.
- 2. It costs as much to take this class (nearly a \$1000) as it does to take any other SRSU three- hour course. Yet you know that this course does not count towards your degree. You will save a lot of money and time if you decide to clear your developmental writing requirement as quickly as possible.
- 3. You are the only one who can make the commitment to be successful in this class. You will decide how much time you spend doing homework, asking your instructor questions, and visiting with a tutor. So come to class and complete this course with a grade of "C" or better this semester.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS AND EXPECTATIONS

Course Requirements: This course is designed to help you become a stronger reader and writer. Therefore, you will do a LOT of reading and writing this semester. I do not expect perfection from you, but I do expect your best effort and gradual improvement. Becoming a better reader and writer requires you working very hard, so that is what I expect from you – hard work and commitment. ENG 0309 can provide the foundation for your success in the university environment. You must take advantage of all the opportunities provided you this semester in this course.

- 1. **Journal:** You will be given a journal topic most class periods. You will be allowed 15 minutes to write at the beginning of class. I will collect your journal entries daily. If you are late to class, then you will have less time to write your journal and your grade will be impacted. While I want you to use your best grammar and spelling, the emphasis of this assignment is to have you practice your writing skills as well as your ability to generate information on a given topic. I will be using your journals, in part, as evidence of your attendance, so you will be counted absent if you do not submit a journal entry for that class period. There is no make-up for missed journals.
 - a. Note: If you are uncomfortable handwriting the journal entries, you are welcome to write them in a word document and submit them that way. However, you must send me your journal entry for that day BY THE END OF CLASS.
- 2. **Daily Work (In-Class Assignments and Participation):** I will rarely announce quizzes ahead of time. If homework is assigned, it is due the following class period (unless otherwise stated). In-class work should be finished before class is over. If work is not completed during class time, it will then be assigned as homework and expected to be returned the next class period. You are expected to participate in class discussions. Participation is part of this grade. There is no make-up for missed assignments. Your writing must be legible for me to be able to grade it.

- 3. **Quizzes:** The quizzes will cover material that we have discussed in that section/module of the course.
- 4. **Midterm Exam:** The Midterm will cover the reading and grammar topics that we have discussed up until that point. The Midterm will count as much as 2 Quizzes and will serve as a checkpoint to asses your progress and needs.
- 5. **Final Exam:** The Final Exam will cover the reading and grammar topics that we discuss over the course of the semester. Students must take the Final Exam and have a passing grade to pass the course.

Extra Credit: Throughout the semester, I will offer extra credit opportunities. There will only be a few, so do not rely on them as an alternative to turning in quality work. These extra credit opportunities will be in the form of campus-sanctioned service projects or campus-wide academic/research events. Proof of participation will be required and described ahead of time. I will announce these opportunities as soon as possible.

Attendance: To be successful, you must attend class. Therefore, satisfactory attendance is a course requirement. Don't throw away anything until you have received your final grade at the end of the semester. I will try to keep the gradebook as up to date as possible, but keeping your work, you will always give you an approximate idea of what your current grade is.

Respect: Every single person in our class will always be respected. Disrespectful behavior or language will not be tolerated. Any offenses will be reflected in your grade and repeated incidents will be reported and considered for removal from the course.
