Assignments:

BlackBoard assignments (5): BlackBoard assignments will be based upon the subject covered and will involve participatory discussion board efforts. All assignments will be posted on BlackBoard.

Country assignments (6): Students will be assigned countries from the six continents/regions of the world. Students will compile demographic, environmental, political, and anecdotal information and post on the appropriate thread on BlackBoard. A sample will be posted.

Video book discussion: Students will read the supplementary book (*Prisoners of geography*) and participate in **one** of two assessments (**Pick one**): 1.) Participate in a virtual book discussion on **Dec. 7** @ **5:15 - 6:15 CST**. Please be prepared to discuss what you feel are important or fallacious points about the Marshall book. Each of you will be expected to make a scholarly contribution; or 2.) Write a ten-page examination of the Marshall book complete with examples from current events and multiple sources (please use APA style). I hope you can infer which I prefer, and I look forward to seeing each of you on that date.
