Sul Ross State University Course Syllabus for Web-Delivered Course Spanish 2311 Intermediate Spanish I Fall 2023.

Course Description:

For the non-native speaker of Spanish, Spanish 2311 is the continuation of Spanish 1411 and 1412. Native speakers should begin their study of Spanish with 2311. This course includes a review of grammatical patterns and development of speaking, listening, reading, and writing skills through exploring the many facets of Hispanic culture.

Student Contributions

- 1. Each student will spend at least 5 hours a week preparing for this class.
- 2. Online attendance and participation are very important in this class.

NOTE: Those whose native language is Spanish, or those who have otherwise acquired a speaking knowledge of Spanish, should begin their study of Spanish with Spanish 2311. The course will meet the needs of those who have obtained a speaking knowledge of Spanish with little or no formal study. Successful completion of such a course will prepare the student to register for 2312.

GOALS: We are going to adhere to the goals of the national Standards for *Foreign Language Learning* which stresses the teaching of the four skills of listening, speaking, reading, and writing through diverse class activities. The emphasis here for the non-native speaker of Spanish is to increase fluency in the target language and for the native speaker of Spanish to make him/her conscious of the structure of the Spanish language and to make him/her more confident in the use of Spanish. Through the textbook and audio-visual materials -also- we will develop a sensitivity to and appreciation for the perspectives, practices, and products of Hispanic culture

STUDENT LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

- 1. Students will review and gain an in-depth knowledge of grammatical structures.
- 2. Students will gain fluency in Spanish through total immersion method.
- 3. Students will increase their skills in writing in Spanish by writing two compositions and homework.
- 4. Students will increase their vocabulary by learning about different situations and through reading.

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- 5. Students who already know some Spanish, native speakers, will gain confidence in the use of learning the grammar of the language they already speak.
- 6. Students will learn about the Hispanic world by reading about the culture, geography, etc. of the different countries.

Assessment:

The expected learning outcomes for this course will be assessed through a series of assessment tools. The student's success will be evaluated according to the following plan:

- Participation and attendance 10%: the students require to complete each assignment on time and do not omit any exercises, or/and homework or/an assignments each week. It is essential to follow the course activities calendar.
- Oral presentation = 10% short presentations from 2-5 minutes. (Audio and video) [SLOs 1-4]
- Online activities and homework = 20% [SLOs 1-4]
- Quizzes /Controles = 20% Students will be quizzed on high frequency and model verbs and will be evaluated on their mastery of the verb system in exam and writing assignments. [SLOs 1-4]



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- Chapter exams and the Final exam = 30% [SLOs 1-4] These exams test grammatical component of the assigned work. They will also test the student's vocabulary abilities. Student will also have to create an original dialog and/or a composition. (BlackBoard exams)
- Short writing composition 10% Writing assignments will allow students to use the appropriate accentuation in written communications. In addition, student will develop metalingual awareness and vocabulary. [SLOs 1- 4].

CHAPTER EXAMS. - These exams will include a grammatical and a listening component. They will also test the student's vocabulary abilities. Every chapter exam will include an oral comprehension component. Student will also have to create an original dialog and/or a composition. (BlackBoard exams)

MINI ORAL PRESENTATIONS, AND QUIZZES: Quizzes will be assigned on SRSU Blackboard and will have a fixed due date. Mini oral presentations may be presented on BlackBoard Ultra or Teams, or a video recording

PARTICIPATION AND ATTENDANCE: Your participation is tied to you completing of the work assigned.

FINAL EXAM: The final oral exam will be based on previously studied grammar points– 50 questions. You will have a brief conversation with me. Oral accuracy and verbal expression are the two key elements that I will be grading.
