It is important that you purchase this as soon as possible (by the fifth day of class); you will not be able to pass the course without it.

Supplies: paper and writing utensils, folder to keep possible handouts

Class Conduct: Please be respectful to both the other students and to your instructor. I have a zero-tolerance policy towards disrespect and bad classroom behavior. Problem students will be dropped from the course and if things escalate further, I will also recommend you be expelled from the university.

Attendance Policy: Class attendance is mandatory and crucial to succeed in this course.

- If you only attend class twice a week, you will be dropped with an "F" after the 6th absence.
- If you attend class three times a week, you will be dropped with an "F" after the 9th absence.

Three tardies count as one absence, so please come to class, and be on time. Students who are sleeping in class will be marked as absent. Students who sit and do nothing when in-class work is assigned will be marked as absent. Students who leave the classroom for extended period of time will be marked absent, and students who are using cell phones or other electronic devices for anything other than class work will be marked absent. Come to class, do your work, and you will pass this class.

Participation: Participation is key for this course, this is not a spectator sport. Interact with the class and show active participation.

Grading: The Following is a breakdown of the grading system. Work turned in for a skill that has already been completed will **not** be accepted. It is your responsibility to find out what the assignments are if you are absent. Quizzes and tests can be given at any day of the week, so please be here. **IMPORTANT:** I will not accept late work **AFTER** 11:59 pm on Sunday of each week, so stay on top of your work!

Quizzes: Will be given on the readings or the Ten Steps Site. These Quizzes will not be long, but they will be frequent. Quizzes count for **Twenty-Five Percent** of your grade.

History Final Grade: Since this class is paired with History 1301, your History Final Grade will count as **Twenty-Five** Percent of your grade.

Homework/Conduct/Participation: Every student starts out with 100 points for the Homework/Conduct/Participation grade. For each missed homework assignment, I will deduct 5 points from your 100. I will also deduct 5 points from your next quiz. After the third offense, you will receive a zero on the next quiz. My hope is that the penalty for not doing homework is so great that you will in fact do it. Sometimes I will collect the homework, other times I will go around the class and check it. I will also call on you to see if you have done it. If you don't have it done, just tell me you don't have it done. Remember, it is your responsibility to find out what the assignments are if you are absent. Never use the excuse, "I wasn't here," when called on to answer a problem. If you are absent, find out what you've missed by contacting another student in the class or me.

Poor conduct will not be tolerated in class: this includes talking, playing with your phone, arriving late to class in a loud manner, being disruptive, or in any way being disrespectful to the learning environment. Every time I have to correct your behavior, I will deduct 5 points from this portion of your grade.

Participation will be taken into account on a weekly basis. Two points will be deducted each week from students that do not participate in class. Homework/Conduct/Participation will make up **fifteen percent of your grade.**

Attendance: Every student starts out with 100 points for attendance. After two absences, ten points will be deducted for each subsequent absence. After two tardies, five points will be deducted for each subsequent tardy. Attendance will make up **ten percent of your grade**.

Journals: At the end of each week, you will be tasked with writing a journal entry; these will either consist of free writing or a writing prompt. Make sure to keep your journals compiled in either one notebook or word document. The Complete Set of journals is worth **ten percent of your grade**.

Final Exam: The final exam will be structured just like your diagnostic exam and will make up **twenty percent of your grade**.

Class Structure (A typical class day): The only way to truly become a better reader is to read, so we will be doing a lot of reading. This course is going to be a mixture of self-paced learning, lecture, and one-on-one help. We will be learning the skills necessary to become better readers, so you may apply them to college intensive reading courses

Everything you learn can, and will, be applied to your online history text. In addition, we will also learn how to write concise, detailed in class essay questions

The TSIA Exam: You may elect to take the TSIA exam any time during the course. If you pass the exam, you will no longer be required to attend this course and will receive an "A."

Extra Credit: These points will be placed on your quizzes. What Extra Credit is offered will be announced throughout the semester!
