

# **Course Description**

Welcome to ENGL 3304, a course on Shakespeare's plays including comedy, tragedy, history. My name is Dr. Sally Roche and I have the honor of guiding your learning in this course. In this course, you will view recorded performances and film versions of Shakespeare's plays and then read the plays (see books above).

This class is taught online. You will need an active Sul Ross State University (SRSU) account to access the course website through Blackboard. This site will have announcements, learning modules, and other resources. Students must have a functioning laptop or desktop computer with reliable internet access.

#### Argument (revised informative essay)

You will rewrite an AI-generated informative essay as an argument supported with textual references. Use MLA documentation style.

*Literary Analysis* (scholarly essay revised for high school audience) You will rewrite a scholarly article as an argument for high school readers.

*Oral Presentation* (recorded video of your presentation of an argument). You will record yourself presenting an argument about Shakespeare's drama supported with textual references (MLA Style).
