SYLLABUS FOR HISTORY 4318 SPRING 2024

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LEARNING OBJECTIVES:

SLO—The history student will demonstrate the ability to write about topics in historiography and how those topics are interpreted.

Marketable skills---Students can utilize data to persuade various audiences.

Students can utilize data to generate and strengthen ideas.

Students can decipher stances adopted by various individuals.

In this course, the students will learn the historical development of the kingdom of Kiev.

The students will also analyze the Mongol conquest of Russia.

The students will also become familiar with the rise of the kingdom of Moscow.

The students will also concentrate on the Time of Troubles and the consequences resulting from that decisive event in Russian history.

The students will also focus on the reign of Peter the Great and his successors in the eighteenth century,

The students will also examine the development of Russia in the nineteenth century, especially

the reform period of Alexander II.

Finally, the students will also learn the Russian revolution and its aftermath in the twentieth century.

TEXTBOOKS AND EXAMS:

The textbook needed for this class is <u>Russia and the Soviet Union: An Historical Introduction</u> from the Kievan State to the Present by John M. Thompson (7TH EDITION) ISBN-978-0-8133-4696-0.. STUDENTS SHOULD CAREFULLY READ ASSIGNMENTS IN THE TEXTBOOK TO ENSURE A PASSING GRADE.

STUDENTS WILL BE ALLOWED TO TAKE EACH EXAM TWICE, AND BLACKBOARD WILL RECORD THE HIGHEST GRADE OF THE TWO ATTEMPTS. BOTH ATTEMPTS MUST BE COMPLETED IN THE SAME DAY THAT EXAM IS POSTED.

The student will prove their mastery of the material learned in the textbook by taking five exams during the semester. The exams will consist of only multiple-choice questions, fifty questions per exam. Each of the exams will be worth one hundred points. The final exam will not be comprehensive but will incorporate only the material assigned in the last reading assignment. Make up exams will be allowed only under the most extraordinary circumstances. Exams will be posted sometime in the morning of the due date and will stay posted until 8:00 p.m.

Students will also be required to make in class presentations. They will derive their presentations from assigned readings in the textbook. They will conduct a total of ten presentations during the semester, and these presentations will each be worth twenty points for a total of 200 points.

Therefore, the total number of points possible will amount to 600 points, and the final grade for students will consist of the percentage of points earned to the total number of points possible.
