# **Course Structure-Where to Go and How:**

## **Course Requirements**

There are a number of requirements for this course.

- Email me within the first week of class and let me know that you have read and understand the syllabus and have located the book. Please do this by Friday July 12 at the latest.
- 2. Read the book and write a four page review. The review is due Friday July 19, 2024.
- 3. Research and write a fifteen page research paper on American foreign policy and one Latin American nation in particular (preferably Cuba, Mexico, Guatemala, Nicaragua, Honduras, El Salvador, Venezuela, Columbia, Chile, or Argentina). The topic approval must be Monday July 22, 2024.
- 4. The paper should be fifteen pages, the title page and bibliography does not count. Twelve Font and adhere to the M.L.A. format.

- 5. You must use two books other than Empire's Workshop, if you need titles and recommendations, please ask me. Internet sources may be used but make sure they are credible (Ancient Alien shows do not count!)
- 6. The research paper is due by Tuesday August 13, 2024
- 7. Papers will be evaluated on the following points:
- 1. strength of your historical arguments and content
- 2. how well you have used historical evidence to support your arguments composition (i.e., spelling, grammar, sentence structure) form (i.e., correct citation)

Substituting for another student; permitting any other person, or otherwise assisting any other person to substitute for oneself or for another student in the taking of an examination or test or the preparation of academic work to be submitted for academic credit. 6. Bribing another person to obtain a non-administered test or information about a no administered test. 7. Purchasing, or otherwise acquiring and submitting as one's own work any research paper or other writing assignment prepared by an individual or firm. This section does not apply to the typing of a rough and/or final version of an assignment by a professional typist. 8. "Plagiarism" means the appropriation and the unacknowledged incorporation of another's work or idea in one's own written work offered for credit. 9. "Collusion" means the unauthorized collaboration with another person in preparing written work offered for credit. 10. "Abuse of resource materials" means the mutilation, destruction, concealment, theft or alteration of materials provided to assist students in the mastery of course materials. 11. "Academic work" means the preparation of an essay, dissertation, thesis, report, problem, assignment, or other project that the student submits as a course requirement or for a grade. 12. "Falsification of Data" means the representation, claim, or use of research, data, statistics, records, files, results, or information that is falsified, fabricated, fraudulently altered, or otherwise misappropriated or misrepresented.

All academic dishonesty cases may be first considered and reviewed by the faculty member. If the faculty member believes that an academic penalty is necessary, he/she may assign a penalty but must notify the student of his/her right to appeal to the department

chair, the dean and eventually, to the Provost and Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs before imposition of the penalty. At each step in the process, the student shall be entitled to written notice of the offense and/or of the administrative decision, an opportunity to respond, and an impartial disposition as to the merits of his/her case. The decision of the Provost and Vice President for Academic and Student Affairs shall be final.
