

Course Syllabus | Fall 2024

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Course Description

This online class will introduce you to a surprisingly complex and fascinating topic—why and how humans prey on other species, and the impacts of that predation. Over the last approximately 3 million years, hunting became and remained an essential component of our daily lives. This fundamental fact did not change until we developed an increasing reliance on domesticated plants and animals over the last ca. 10,000 years. Towards the end of the last ice age human predation may have contributed to the demise of numerous species of megafauna. The archaeological record, as well as recent historical accounts offer insights into what ancient hunting practices may have looked like, and perhaps more importantly, how hunting can be conceived in drastically different ways across cultures. Hunting now faces a diversity of challenges in a world characterized by accelerated change and global impacts of industrialization.

In this class, we will take a three-step approach to the topic of hunting, beginning with 1) the archaeological record, 2) the historical/ethnographic record, and 3) exploring the diverse challenges of hunting today. Within each of these three units you will be engaged with short lectures, readings, and small group activities through the online portal. This class relies on the self-motivation of the student, but does not issue monumental tasks such as studying for an exam—the goal is to continually engage, empower, and challenge you, the student with the online material.

Course objectives

After completing this course students will be able to

- Describe the relevance of hunting to human evolution
- Draw from archaeological and historical evidence to create a timeline of hunting technology and tactics
- Identify historical trends in Western thinking about hunting and contrast this with other cultural viewpoints
- Describe the role that contemporary thinking about hunting plays in the creation and mitigation of conservation, ecology, and humanitarian issues
