### **Course Description:**

This course provides an introduction to piano study for students with little or no keyboard background. Topics to be covered include the acquisition of keyboard technique, score reading, pitch and rhythm notation, harmonization of simple melodies, transposition, improvisation, ensemble playing, and accompaniment styles.

### **Required Text:**

Lancaster, E. L. and Kenon D. Renfrow. *Alfred's Group Piano for Adults, Book One*. 2<sup>nd</sup> edition, Van Nuys, CA: Alfred Publishing Company, 2004.

### **Primary Learning Objectives:**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

- 1) Read and perform melodies in treble and bass clefs, employing proper elements of pitch, rhythm, dynamics, and articulation
- 2) Understand the application of time signatures, key signatures, pitch notation, and rhythmic notation
- 3) Accompany simple melodies with left-hand chords
- 4) Understand and apply chord notation using standard Roman numeral symbols
- 5) Transpose a simple melody no more than a whole step up or down
- 6) Harmonize a short melody by analyzing its chordal implications

**Student Learning Outcomes:**

- 1) Students will demonstrate the ability to integrate appropriate musical expression and knowledge into performance
- 2) Students will demonstrate the ability to research and prepare appropriate program notes, using analytical and theoretical skills
- 3) Students will demonstrate the ability to evaluate and critique a musical performance, using analytical and theoretical skills

**Attendance:**

Regular, punctual attendance is essential for the educational objectives of this course to be achieved. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of every class.

In accordance with the *Sul Ross State University Student Handbook*, any student who accumulates more than nine (9) absences per semester, whether excused or unexcused, may be dropped from a course at the faculty member's discretion.

Students are responsible for all class materials, activities, and announcements made when absent.

University excused absences will allow students to make up or complete assignments incurred by absence without penalty. The following instances constitute a university-excused absence: 1) documented illness with note from a medical provider; 2) family emergency; 3) university-approved activity.

In the case of a university-excused absence, major tests will be rescheduled. An unexcused absence shall result in a grade of zero for any quiz, daily assignment, or homework grade taken that day.

Two tardies shall equal one absence.

**Assignments:**

Written homework assignments will be given at the end of most class meetings.

All assignments are due at the beginning of class unless otherwise announced.

Unexcused late assignments will be penalized 10 points per class meeting. No work will be accepted more than one week past its due date.

No penalty will be assessed for work completed upon return from a university-excused absence, provided such work is submitted in a timely manner.

Quizzes will be unannounced, and no rescheduling will be allowed as a result. Quizzes given at the beginning of class may not be made up if a student arrives late, nor may any portion thereof be completed for credit.

**Missed Assignments, Quizzes, or Exams:**

In the event of an unforeseen absence, extensions of time to take and/or complete daily assignments and/or exams may be granted on a case-by-case basis. The circumstances surrounding such extensions must be documented in writing and advance notice given where possible.
