Course description: This course reviews in detail the most challenging grammatical aspects

Course Objectives: 1. Understand the interaction among a wide variety of elements within a literary piece.

- 2. Use previous linguistic knowledge to comprehend complex rhetoric figures.
- 3. Further develop reading competencies of literature.
