Course Overview:

In this course we will be surveying art, architecture, and craft through prehistory through 1400 ce. With some of the earliest cave paintings dating back to 15,000 BCE this course will begin with the works of art and life witnessed through visual creation in the nomadic early stages (the caves). We will trace the development of art/craft through early civilization. We will observe the relationship of society and art by observing the timeline of art history through the rise of the first cities, the earliest systems of writing, burial practices, and paintings on the walls of cathedrals. By observing the basics of the beginning of what we know now to be our current day world of art we will be able to think about the functions of art and the advancement of spaces. Some questions: How does the cave relate to the cathedral? How does adronments communicate social standing? How do stories inform value structures and the ethics of communities? When does the artist become the artist? How does religion inform artistic and ritual practices? How does art/craft play a role in culture and tradition?

Every class will be accompanied by a reading that overviews the time period and a cultural text to accompany a weekly ponderance. We will look at the tower of Babel, paleolithic whistles and figurines,

the mosaics of cathedrals. This course at its core is a meditation on the basics of existence and the pulse of life and creation through objects, movements, and naming—"In the bigining...".
