Class Conduct: Please be respectful to both the other students and to your instructor. I have a zero-tolerance policy towards disrespect and bad classroom behavior. If you only attend class twice a week, you will be dropped with an "F" after the 6th absence.
If you attend class three times a week, you will be dropped with an "F" after the 9th absence.
Three tardies count as one absence, so please come to class and be on time. Students who are sleeping in class will be marked as absent. Students who sit and do nothing when in-class work is assigned will be marked absent. Students who leave the classroom for extended periods of time will be marked absent, and students who are using cell phones or other electronic devices for anything other than classwork will be marked absent. Come to class, do your work, and you will pass this class.

Quizzes Will be given on the readings or the Ten Steps Site. These Quizzes will not be long, but they will be frequent. Each quiz will be worth 20 points towards your final grade total. Students are given **ONE** retry for every quiz should their grade be lower than desired; afterward, the highest of the two grades will be used as the final quiz grade.

Homework/Conduct/Participation: Every homework assignment counts for 10 points towards your final grade total. It must be done on time, and late work will result in a point deduction.

Poor conduct will not be tolerated in class. This includes talking, playing with your phone, arriving late to class loudly, being disruptive, or disrespecting the learning environment in any way. Every time I have to correct your behavior, I will deduct 5 points from this portion of your grade.

Participation will be considered weekly. Students who do not participate in class will lose two points each week.

Attendance: Every student starts with 100 points for attendance. After two absences, ten points will be deducted for each subsequent absence, and after two tardies, five points will be deducted for each subsequent tardy.

Journals: At the end of each week, you will be tasked with writing a journal entry, either free writing or a writing prompt. Keep your journals compiled in either one notebook or a Word document.

Final Exam: The Final exam will consist of all the lessons we have reviewed throughout the semester.

Class Structure (A typical class day): The only way to truly become a better reader is to read, so we will do a lot of reading. This course will be a mixture of self-paced learning, lectures, and one-on-one help. We will be learning the skills necessary to become better readers so that you may apply them to college-intensive reading courses.

The TSIA Exam: You may elect to take the TSIA exam at any time during the course. If you pass the exam, you will no longer be required to attend this course and will receive an "A."

Extra Credit: These points will be placed on your quizzes. What Extra Credit is offered will be announced throughout the semester!
