2. Course Overview

- This course is designed for students who are serious about studying all aspects of fiction and fiction writing. It is not a survey course in world literature, rather focusing almost exclusively on stories that are relevant to our time.
- It is also intended to develop your research, analytic abilities, writing skills and awareness of current events. Fiction, even dystopic fiction, at its best incorporates current trends and events. Fact is always stranger than fiction.
- By the end of this course, you should have a deep understanding of modern fiction content and the ability to write it.
- This course will incorporate all aspects of modern content, including books, movies, and social media.
- Assignments and tests will be administered in person.

3. Course Primary Learning Objectives

- By the conclusion of this course the student should be proficient in:
 - i. Analyzing fictional content
 - ii. Writing fictional content
 - iii. Analyzing current events

4. Student Learning Outcomes

- The successful student will be able to:
 - i. Develop works of fictional content
 - ii. Analyze fictional content
 - iii. Understand current events and incorporate them into your writing

5. Course Requirements

- Students are expected to attend class and participate in exercises
- Review news daily on https://apnews.com (Free) and be aware of international, national and local current events
- Assignments are due on the day indicated in the syllabus. Late assignments will be reduced by a full letter grade unless the student provides a medical excuse from a doctor or a verified family emergency.
- Final writing project
- Participation in class discussion required.
- Students in this class must abide by appropriate online behavior.

6. Criteria for Grade Evaluation

- Each student will be graded on the basis of adherence to the assignment's guidelines in an effective and comprehensive way. Effort and improvement over the course of the term are the two most important criteria for grading.
- Evaluation of performance in this class is largely subjective, and as such this aspect of the class will be solely at the professor's discretion.
