About this course

Our graduate poetry workshop will consist of generative, experimental, and encouraging virtual sessions. We'll meet weekly to discuss everyone's current poetry submissions, which are due two days before class. Each of us will come to class with our notes on all attendee's poems, which will allow for an animated discussion of the achievements of each poem and what we can imagine for this poem's future. We'll return these notes to the poet, so they have easy access to everyone's ideas when it's time to submit their revisions.

To bolster our foundation, I've selected a list of excellent poets from whom I believe we can glean new ideas, techniques, forms, vocabulary, and styles. Each of us (me included!) will come to class ready to present one poem from this week's poet to the rest of the class. Each week, each of you will walk us through your selected poem step by step, showing us how your inquisitive eye reads this work, and share with us why you thought this would be interesting for your fellow poets to know. You're welcome to look ahead at the list of poets and find volumes of their work to purchase. You're also welcome to use the internet to find poems for your weekly presentations.

I've also selected a gaggle of prose works that have wide possibilities. We will sometimes read quite straightforward writing about the craft of poetics, and other times, we'll read work that seems far away from the topic at hand. (I do hope we're reading widely and finding ideas in the element of surprise.) We'll discuss these readings in class, connecting them to our poetry, our course discussions, and the poets we've read all the while.

The end of this course will require that you submit a short volume of your work to me, 5 poems and a foreword by the author. This can be composed of poems from this course you've brought through revision, or this can be entirely new work. This volume will be due to Blackboard at the start of class on our last meeting.
