## **Course Description**

This course provides an examination of the intersection of sport and society: implications of class, race, and gender-based social issues in youth, college, and professional sport structures.

## **Purpose of the Course**

Social Issues in Sport is designed to acquaint students with the principles and applications of social issues within the sport industry. The course is grounded in sociological research and requires critical thinking to investigate the links between many major issues facing sports organizations today. Specifically, we will assess the intersection of race and sports, gender and sports, class and sports, media, and sports, as well as the issues plaguing youth, college, and professional sports in American society.

## **Marketable Skills**

## The following marketable skills are met in this course:

- **Critical Thinking:** Analyze social issues in sports, including gender, race, media, and access, connecting them to sociological theories.
- **Research Skills:** Conduct independent research, analyze studies, and apply theoretical concepts to real-world sports scenarios.
- **Data Collection:** Practice data collection techniques, including observation, interviews, and media analysis, for the final project.
- **Effective Communication:** Develop written and verbal communication skills through discussions, assignments, and a multimedia final project.
- **Digital Literacy:** Use digital tools, including Connect SmartBook, for learning and multimedia presentation formats for the final project.
- **Cultural Awareness:** Explore how social factors like gender, race, and ability impact sports participation and representation.
- **Problem-Solving:** Identify social issues in sports, propose solutions, and support conclusions with evidence in the final project.
- **Professionalism:** Demonstrate time management, organization, and accountability by completing assignments and the final project on schedule.

## **Course Objectives**

Upon completion of this course, students will be able to do the following:

- Understand Sociological Concepts in Sports: Explain how socialization, ideology, and cultural norms influence sports.
- Analyze Sports Participation: Evaluate factors that impact sports involvement across age, gender, and cultural backgrounds.
- **Identify Deviance and Violence in Sports:** Define and differentiate between deviance, overconformity, and violence in sports.
- **Examine Gender, Race, and Social Class in Sports:** Assess how these social factors influence access, participation, and representation.
- **Explore Age and Ability in Sports:** Analyze how ageism, ableism, and disabilities impact sports participation.
- **Investigate Economic Aspects of Sports:** Understand the relationship between sports, commercialization, and athlete income.
- **Evaluate Sports and Media:** Analyze how media shapes public perceptions of sports and influences fan engagement.

- **Examine Politics in Sports:** Understand government and global influence on sports, including international events.
- Understand Religion in Sports: Explore the connections between sports and religion, including faith-based organizations.
- **Predict Future Trends in Sports:** Identify emerging trends and analyze potential changes in sports culture.

To ensure a successful start to the course, students must complete the following pre-course assignments:

## 1. Syllabus Check & Quiz (10 points total)

- Format: 10 multiple-choice questions, worth 1 point each
- **Purpose:** This quiz is designed to confirm that you have thoroughly read and understood the syllabus, including important policies, expectations, and course logistics.
- Attempts: You may take the quiz as many times as you like. Your highest score will be recorded.

• Submission of this quiz indicates that you acknowledge and understand all course expectations as outlined in the syllabus.

#### 2. Introduce Yourself Discussion (10 points total)

- **Initial Post (5 points):** Use the provided prompts to write a thoughtful introduction so your instructor and classmates can get to know you.
- **Replies to Classmates (5 points):** Respond meaningfully to at least **two** classmates' posts (2.5 points each).
- **Purpose:** This assignment helps build community and connection in our online learning environment.

## **Class Activities**

## **Instructions:**

In this course, you will engage in a variety of class activities designed to enhance your understanding of the sociology of sport and prepare you for the Final Project. These activities are carefully planned to help you apply sociological concepts, develop critical thinking skills, and gain practical experience with research and data collection.

## **Types of Class Activities:**

## 1. Discussions (3 Total – 180 Points)

- Purpose: Encourage critical thinking and peer interaction on key sociological topics in sports.
- Format:
  - Initial post: You will respond to a discussion prompt with a well-thought-out answer using course concepts.
  - Peer responses: You will engage with at least two classmates, providing constructive feedback or additional insights.
- Grading: Each discussion is worth 60 points.
- Topics:
  - **Discussion 1:** Defining Sport and Its Social Impact.
  - **Discussion 2:** Media Representation of Athletes.
  - **Discussion 3:** Social Issues in Sports.

#### 2. Connect SmartBook Chapter Readings (16 Total – 320 Points)

- Purpose: Provide foundational knowledge on key sociological concepts in sports.
- Access: Complete SmartBook readings through McGraw Hill Connect in Blackboard.
- Complete the SmartBook reading by answering the embedded questions as you progress.
- Grading: Each chapter is worth 20 points.
- Important: Ignore the 6/29 due date in Connect. Always check the syllabus and weekly announcements for correct due dates.

#### 3. Assignments (5 Total – 330 Points)

- Purpose: Develop your skills in critical reflection, media analysis, research, and data collection.
- Assignment List:
  - Assignment 1: Sociology of Sport Pre-Test (30 Points)
    - Complete a 26-item true-false quiz to assess your baseline knowledge.
    - You will have the option to retake this quiz between Week 5 and Week 6.
  - Assignment 2: Sport and Society Reflection (75 Points)
    - Reflect on your personal sports experiences and connect them to sociological concepts.
  - Assignment 3: Media Analysis of Sports Representation (75 Points)
    - Analyze a sports media example (article, video, social media post) for representations of gender, race, or social class.
  - Assignment 4: Research Investigation (75 Points)
    - Conduct research on a sociological issue in sports, analyzing credible sources.
  - Assignment 5: Observation Project Youth Sports (75 Points)
    - Observe interactions in a youth sports setting and analyze the social dynamics.
- 4. Final Project: Society and Sport An In-Depth Sociological Analysis (150 Points)
  - Purpose: Demonstrate your understanding of sociological concepts by conducting an in-depth analysis of a social issue in sports.
  - Project Options:

- Research Paper (5 pages minimum)
  - Multimedia Presentation
    - Save your presentation as a PowerPoint or as a PDF with a voiceover.
- Project Components:
  - Introduction: State your chosen social issue and its significance.
  - Literature Review: Use at least two credible research articles.
  - **Methods:** Describe your data collection methods (observation, interviews, media analysis).
  - **Findings:** Present your observations, interview quotes, or media analysis results.
  - **Discussion:** Connect your findings to sociological theories.
  - **Conclusion:** Summarize insights and suggest solutions.

## **Course Requirements Deadline**
