Description

My name is Alicia Trotman and I am excited to learn with you as we dive into discovering human sexuality. What is sexuality? Every day, we make a decision... to brush our teeth, to put on a nice pair of shoes, to read that tweet, or hopefully read that book! In that breath, we must be nurtured and supported in our efforts to create. Passion does not gain momentum by itself... we need that connection with others to span and heal the gaps, doubts, insecurities, and detachments. Consent is critical, because if not given, one's sexuality can be discredited, insulted, and raped. Safety is also paramount, because if not secured, one's sexuality can be accosted by dis-ease. So sexuality is not only physical? Correct! It is comprised of the essence of the human being and with consent and safety, the human can thrive in ways that are exponential.

Course Objective:

This course is designed to introduce you to the psychological study of human sexuality. It will in engage you in current and real-world issues and provides opportunities for you to develop the expertise and practice the skills

required to make informed choices about sexuality for yourself and those you care about. Memorization is not key... rather your understanding of common and unique behaviors and mental processes of the human being at each expressive stage.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Throughout the course, you will be encouraged to think about how the research presented can shed light on events going on around the world and in your own lives. Briefly stated, the objectives of this course include (though are not limited to):

- Given that sexuality is the hallmark of human expression, students will be able to <u>identify</u> the variety of
 ways humans choose to express themselves in life, and <u>illustrate</u> how the physical bodies of human beings
 are divine as the culmination of those expressions.

- 2. Given that sexuality involves attraction, students will be able to <u>examine</u> the energies behind those passions in building healthy and nurturing relationships, not only with other humans but with lifelong goals.
 - Method of Formative Assessment: Quizzes, Assignments, Perusall Assignments, and Final Exam
- 3. Given that there is a multitude of life paths that human beings, there is a multitude of sexual orientations, providing space for you to evaluate your own sexuality in a positive way which most definitely may not look like another's. You can practice this discovery by consistently posting comments and working as a member of our team to explore dilemmas in discussions, your journal entries and assignments.

- 4. Given that safety and consent are paramount for sexuality, students will <u>analyze</u> when these expressions become contaminated with disease with either the body or mind (STIs, disorders) or are violated (harassment, assault, violence), and <u>provide</u> concrete solutions to restoring health and well-being.

Course Requirements:

Late Assignments

You are expected to meet assignment, quiz, discussion, and journal deadlines. Discussion posts submitted after their due dates will be marked as <u>zero</u>. Quizzes and journal posts will be marked as <u>zero</u> after <u>Tuesday July 1st</u>. Assignments will be reduced by 10% of the overall assignment for the first day of lateness and 40% for lateness beyond that for unexcused absences. For excused absences (university-authorized, legal or medical issues), speak with me **before the absence** so arrangements can be made.

EVALUATION

<u>Video Introduction & Syllabus Quiz</u> — This is an asynchronous class, so we are not meeting as a class at any time during the semester. As a result, I will only see your products through your work and not have any idea how *you are uniquely you!* The video introduction helps to give the context I need. The syllabus quiz is to make sure you did not gloss over this... but actually read it! Therefore, I expect you to know what is expected of you in this class, and you know what is expected of me as your instructor.

<u>Quizzes</u> – These quizzes are marked as (Q) in the course schedule. This is an online 10 question test given to ensure that you have *read the chapter* in *Perusall* and understand the most pertinent concepts. These quizzes are available for the duration of the course but must be completed by **Tuesday July 1st**. *They will be marked as <u>zero</u> after this date*. These are automatically graded so you will receive immediate feedback for incorrect answers.

<u>Assignments</u> – These five (5) assignments are marked as (A) in the course schedule. These assignments are designed to challenge you to use your critical thinking skills, and to gain a stronger understanding of human sexuality perspectives.

<u>Discussions</u> – These four (4) discussions are marked as (D) in the course schedule. Two of these four discussions are grouped which means you will post within a small group in the class. These Grouped Discussions will be marked as (GD). You must post and respond to all these discussions in a timely manner, as shown in the course schedule. **If not, you will receive a <u>zero</u> after the posted due date.** A rubric is provided to assess how discussions are scored. All discussions must be completed by **Tuesday July 1st**.

<u>Journals</u> – These five (5) journal entries are marked as (J) in the course schedule. Your journal entries will not be shared with other students in the class and will be kept confidential, so you can choose to write freely. Your journal is available for the duration of the course but must be completed by **Tuesday July 1st**. *They will be marked as <u>zero</u> after this date*. A rubric is provided to assess how journal entries are scored.

<u>Perusall Assignments</u> – There are 17 chapters in this textbook, but we will review only 13 of the 17 of the chapters. Each chapter will be marked as an assignment in <u>Perusall. Persuall</u> automatically grades your activity and tracks how much time you spend reading the chapter, how many highlights or notes made, commenting or responding to another's comment, and assesses the quality of your comments. There is a pre-assignment called 'Making the most of learning with <u>Perusall</u>' that provides information on how to use, and how to learn best with <u>Perusall</u>. The scores in <u>Perusall</u> range from 0 to 3. You can track your progress as you read through the chapters. Your grades are automatically synced to Blackboard at the end of the semester. However, I still enter them manually into Blackboard at the end of the semester to ensure the grades were accurately recorded.

<u>Final Exam</u> – One (1) exam will be given at the end of this term. It consists of 50 multiple choice/short answer questions and one (1) essay question. Fifty percent of the questions for this exam will come directly from the quizzes. The date of this exam is **12:00 am on Wednesday July 2nd until 11:59pm**. Please note that there is no <u>make-up exam</u> unless you are absent due to illness and with documented proof.

Grading

Students are expected to complete reading assignments prior to class sessions and to engage in thoughtful discussions in light of these assignments. In addition, students will take an in-class midterm and an in-class final exam (objective short answer, multiple choice and/or essay).
