Course Description:

This course is an introductory course that will be delivered through BlackBoard and Collaborate.

The course is designed to help students answer the following questions;

What is art?
What does a work of art mean?
What drives an artist to create?
What makes art valuable?
And why is art important?

The course will examine the vocabulary used to describe art, discuss the processes involved in creating art, and survey the history of art over time. By the end of the semester, students will gain a deeper appreciation of artists and their work, along with an enthusiasm and understanding of the visual arts that will enrich their lives.

You will be graded on Chapter Quizzes, Formal Analysis Paper, Film Responses, and two exams. Students are required to participate in discussions. If you rarely or never offer thoughtful comments or questions, you will only get half credit for your participation grade. If you aren't comfortable speaking in front of the class, please come and discuss your concerns with the professor. Details on each assignment (creative projects) will be presented when assigned. The Formal Analysis Essay #1 and Film Responses consist of a minimum of a 250-word paper written in MLA format. All writings should exhibit concise reasoning, good organization, and proper formatting. Footnotes and bibliography are not required, but if you do use outside materials, you must use footnotes and you MUST observe proper stylistic and formatting rules.

Late work will have a deduction of 10 points per week from the total grade after the due date.

Extra Credit: Earn extra credit by visiting an art museum, documenting the visit, and writing a formal analysis of the experience.

Rubric for Formal and Film Response Essays

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The rubric for Formal Analysis #1 and the Final Essay (Formal Analysis #2) will be utilized for the Core Assessment—skill Objective: Critical Thinking.

Formal Analysis #1: Critique employing Elements, Principles, and Functions of Art.

- Formal Elements: A concise formal essay written in the third person, comprising five paragraphs (Introduction/Thesis, and three body paragraphs focusing on the Elements, Principles, and Functions of Art).
- Introduction: Purpose/thesis, art information, and description; 20 points.
- Body Paragraph (Elements): Main ideas, supporting details, and analysis; 20 points.
- Body Paragraph (Principles): Main ideas, supporting details, and analysis; 20 points.
- Body Paragraph (Functions / Social Responsibility): Main ideas, supporting details, and analysis; 20 points.
- Conclusion: Summary statement, critique/judgment; 20 points.

Total Points: 100.

Film Response #1: Critique the film, discuss the significance of the documented art, and reflect on its impact on the viewer.

- A brief formal essay, third person, five paragraphs (Introduction/Thesis, three body paragraphs, and conclusion).
- Introduction: Purpose/thesis, art information, and description; 20 points.
- Body Paragraphs (Analysis): Each 20 points.
- Conclusion: Summary and critique/judgment; 20 points.

Total Points: 100.

Film Response #2: Critique the film, discuss the significance of the documented art, and reflect on its impact on the viewer.

- Following the same structure as above.
- Total Points: 100.

Film Response #3: Critique the film, discuss the significance of the documented art, and reflect on its impact on the viewer.

- Follow the same format.
- Total Points: 100.

Formal Analysis Essay #2: Critique using Elements, Principles, and Functions of Art. (Part of the final exam)

- Core Assessment, Skill Objective: Critical Thinking.
- Formal Elements: Concise formal essay, third person, five paragraphs.
- Introduction: Purpose/thesis, art information, and description; 8 points.
- Body Paragraphs (Elements, Principles, Functions/Social Responsibility): Each 8 points.
- Conclusion: Summary/judgment; 8 points.

Total Points: 40.

Total Points for Formal Analysis Paper and Essays (combined): 10% of the overall grade.

Total Points for Film Responses: 15% of the overall grade.
