Course Overview:

This course is designed for you to expand your photography skills and knowledge. This is a project-driven course in which you will focus on improving your personal photographic practice. Due to the small class size and the nature of this course, this course will function in-part as an independent study with the instructor and will include frequent class discussions, collaborations, and critiques. Emphasis will be placed on personal creative vision and growth, the technical quality of your work, and ability to think and speak critically about your work and the work of others.

Throughout this course you will learn and practice advanced film photography and darkroom techniques and become further acquainted with darkroom set-up and chemicals. You will have the opportunity to try out new cameras and films, to work with experimental processes, color, and/or digital.

Blackboard will be used weekly for the distribution of readings, videos, PowerPoint lectures, and assignments. <u>If you do not have reliable internet access, please talk to the instructor.</u>

Required Course Materials

- Sketchbook/notebook for Artist Journal
- Notebook for taking notes on lectures and demos (or you can use the same notebook as your artist journal)
- Binder for storing negatives, prints, and assignments
- 35mm black and white film and/or color film
- Enlarging paper
- 35mm camera (provided by the instructor)

There is a \$25.00 lab fee for this class. This fee will cover materials and chemicals used for projects done for class only. Paper and film can be purchased from the locations below. Kodak Tri-X 400 Black & White 35mm Film and Ilford Multigrade RC Deluxe Pearl 8x10 paper are always great options, but because this is an advanced course, you may want to try out other film and paper options to expand your experience with materials. We will discuss alternative options throughout the course.

Assessment & Grading Criteria

You will be assessed in <u>each class</u> on your progress and participation in lectures, discussions, assignments, and critiques. The knowledge needed to complete assignments will be gained through in-person lectures and demonstrations that will be difficult to repeat or for you to make up. If you miss class, catching up is your responsibility.

<u>How you are graded</u>: Class participation in critiques, presentations, and discussions - 10%. Photo Assignments - 20%. Artist Journals - 10%. Photographer Research Projects - 20%. Semester Project - 40%.

You will periodically be assigned short readings and/or relevant films on photographic concepts, techniques, or history. These will be posted on Blackboard. Write a short response to the assigned material in your <u>Artist Journal</u>. I will provide prompts on Blackboard to serve as guide for your reflections. You will also be asked to make entries documenting your progress on your semester project, inspirations, and influences. Be prepared to discuss your reflections in class.

Photo Assignments

Photo assignments focusing on advanced photo techniques and alternative processes will be assigned throughout the semester. These assignments are intended to expand the breadth of your photographic skills.

• Semester Project

You will establish an ongoing photographic project with a cohesive theme to be completed throughout the semester. The topic and resulting final product will be of your choosing. You will work closely with the instructor and other students as your project progresses, accepting feedback on your work and offering feedback to your classmates' work. This project will serve as the final for this course.

Photo Research Project

You will complete two photo research projects throughout the semester. For each project, you will choose a relevant topic – either a specific photographer or photographic movement/discipline – and prepare PowerPoint to present to the class.

Topics will be agreed upon in advance with the instructor. For each topic, you will need to choose at least two books and a few additional materials (articles, essays, exhibition reviews, etc.) to support your work. The first project will be due March 6 and the second project on the final class day, May 1.
