A survey of exceptional children involving categorical identification, learning characteristics, instructional intervention, and adjustment needs.

Course Format

This is a hybrid course, meaning there is live instruction and asynchronous work. ALL students will attend class via Blackboard Collaborate for live instruction once a week. You will find all course information and assignments in Blackboard. The course contains module readings, videos, discussions, quizzes, and written assignments. Instruction will be delivered through lecture notes, Blackboard collaboration, and individual/group discussions.

Course Expectations

The instructor will:

- Provide weekly communication and check-ins with students via announcements, videos, or email.
- Be available during office hours posted in syllabus.
- Respond to student emails within 24-48 hours of receipt during the hours of 9:00AM-5:00PM, Monday-Friday. Weekend communication will occur as available.
- Provide grades/feedback to assignments within one week of the submission due date.
- Provide clear and concise instructions on how to complete the online course requirements. Rubrics will be provided when they apply.
- Provide a range of opportunities to engage in the course content in a meaningful way.

<u>Class Participation 100 points:</u> Students are expected to attend class meetings and participate in class discussions. The candidate will demonstrate excellent participation, offer analysis and synthesis of article readings, and add to the development of ideas.

<u>Attendance 100 points:</u> Attendance will be part of your grade. Students are required to <u>TURN ON</u> their Cameras at all times except during break intervals. If Camera is not kept on through out the whole class you will not receive FULL credit for that day. I will be taking Attendance at the end of class.

All Written Assignments: To comply with course standards and requirements all written assignments should reflect all aspects of the project, be free of grammatical errors, well organized, and *typed double-spaced using a 12-point Times New Roman font.* All written assignments that contain references should follow the guidelines indicated by the Publication Manual of the American Psychological Association (7th edition).

Discussion Boards (5@20 points each =100 points): Students will engage in five discussion boards based on textbook or article content. Students will respond to a prompt of a minimum of 150-word max 400 words written response. Students will then respond to at least one classmates' post extending the conversation. In writing your response, strive to have a conversation, a beneficial exchange between professional colleagues. Ask questions, offer suggestions, make comments, give your opinions, and generally react to what your classmates have written. You will not be credited for simply agreeing with someone or telling them how much you like what they wrote. Look critically for the opportunity to share your knowledge and fill in misunderstandings.

<u>Netiquette</u>: The course environment is a collaborative space. Innocent remarks typed in the online environment can be misconstrued. Students must always re-read their responses carefully before posting them, so as others do not consider them as personal offenses. Be positive in your approach with others and diplomatic in selecting your words. Remember that you are not competing with classmates, but sharing information and learning from others. All faculty are similarly expected to be respectful in all communications.

<u>Quizzes/ Check for Understanding 100 points:</u> There are quizzes or checks for understanding in some Modules over the content provided. Questions will be in essay format and multiple choice. Questions are pulled from module assessments and readings.

<u>Flip through Journal 100 points:</u> Students are required to turn in a journal reflection on the notes they have taken throughout the course. Students will then submit a short flip through video explaining their journal. You will not receive full credit if journal is not organized.

<u>Disability Pamphlet (100 points):</u> Students will research a disability and then create a pamphlet that would aid parents in understanding the disability. The pamphlet should include the following: definition of the disability, characteristics of the disability, accommodations and/or modifications for the disability, tips for parents, and any other information you feel would be important for parents to know.

<u>Special Education Vignette (100 points):</u> Students will read a case study vignette about a student with an IEP. Students will then answer a variety of questions based on the case study vignette. Answers should be detailed and written in complete sentences.

Research Paper (100 points): Students will write a 4-8 research paper in APA style. Students will choose one of the 13 recognized learning disabilities examining their characteristics, underlying neurological factors, and the impact they have on learning and academic achievement.

<u>Council for Exceptional Students Activity (5@20 Points each)</u>: Each student will be required to read and review articles regarding exceptional children, disabilities, and/or inclusion, etc and will answer the reflection questions of the activity.

<u>Creating an IEP (100 points each)</u>: You must create an IEP (intervention) plan using the CASE STUDY document provided. Make a plan for each section under the Intervention Plan. Explain the type of activity you would plan for him, accomodations/modifications, etc.

<u>Midterm 100 Points:</u> The midterm will include material covered in the first half of this class. The exam will be multiple choice, short answer, and essay questions. The exam will be timed and live. You must be present and turn your camera ON DURING THE EXAM.

<u>Final Exam (100 points):</u> Student will take a comprehensive final exam over course material same rules apply as the midterm exam.
