Course Topics: Federal and Texas State legal system; torts; crimes; contracts; commercial sales; agency law; employment and equal opportunity laws; forms of business; consumer protection; environmental protection; U.S. Constitution; ethics in the workplace.



- 8. Contrast the various types of current and future interests in real property.
- 9. Communicate ideas effectively, in oral presentation and in writing.
- 10. Apply different ethical models to business situations.

MYLAB

MyLab is the additional website you will use to do assigned work. You will access MyLab from the Pearson Access button in Blackboard. The first time you access MyLab, follow the directions detailed in GETTING STARTED above. This semester you will complete many activities on MyLab. The chapter "warm-ups" prepare and reinforce your efforts as you read the book and learn the material. Due either after coverage of a chapter or chapters, or sometimes before, simulations, videos and/or chapter quizzes assess your ability to apply the concepts. There is a time limit to the quizzes (60 minutes) and you will be allowed two (2) attempts, but there will be no limit to the number of attempts allowed to correctly complete the warmups, simulations and videos. Late assignments will not be accepted. I will not reopen MyLab assignments after the due date and time unless you have a valid medical excuse supported by a doctor's note. One of your obligations as a student is to know the dates and times assignments are due by familiarizing yourself with the schedule in the syllabus. After the due dates and times (found in the SCHEDULE), your grades for all MyLab work will be posted in the Blackboard gradebook. When you check your grades for MyLab assignments or other assignments using the Blackboard app to determine how well you are doing in the course (e.g., your "grade so far"), please make sure that you look at the grades of SUBMITTED/GRADED WORK in comparison to all WORK DUE. Please ask me if you are unable to calculate your grade in this course.



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There will be one written assignment due this semester. The Written Assignment is worth three hundred (300) points and will be submitted in Blackboard. Writing well and learning to write a draft and then edit for the final submission are important life skills. This assignment will be a 5–6-page research paper on a pre-selected topic. The research will be a closed universe, meaning I will provide you with all of the sources you will use for the paper. More details on the paper, draft requirements, and other specifics will be provided in class.
