The purpose of this syllabus is to outline the semester for you in a manner that is easy to read and understand. I will cover the course requirements, assignments, deadlines, grading scale, and any and all other expectations of this course. Course Delivery

Course Description

Basic legal principles, terminology, and risk management approaches; applications of legal principles to protection of employees, and employers in kinesiology related fields, contemporary ethical issues.

Expectation of Students

Students are responsible for keeping up with the reading and are expected to read the assigned chapters and/or other posted readings prior to class. Handouts distributed through Blackboard should be kept in a notebook in order to be referred to as necessary.

Student Learning Outcomes

At the conclusion of the course each student will be able to:

- 1. Explain why we live in a litigious society and the importance of managing risk.
- 2. Differentiate between civil and criminal law, the types of torts, and the place that negligence fits within the legal system.
- 3. Discuss the difference between the federal court system and the state court system, and why we find federal cases in the context of recreation, sport and tourism.
- 4. Analyze the elements of negligence and sources of information used to determine the standard of care.
- 5. Define the concept of strict liability, how it differs from ordinary negligence, and the types of situations that might give rise to a strict liability claim.
- 6. Summarize the defenses to negligence, which legal protections shift the responsibility to the plaintiff.
- 7. Describe the elements that are needed to make a valid and enforceable waiver, and pitfalls in drafting and implementing a waiver.
- 8. Define intentional torts, and their essential elements, where harm occurs to a person.
- 9. Describe the intentional torts that apply to property, both real and personal, and the essential elements of these torts.
- 10. Identify the common defenses to intentional torts discussed in chapters 6 and 7.
- 11. Discuss human rights covered in the textbook.
- 12. Describe the legal issues and civil legal actions that can arise associated with due process, privacy, speech and religion.
- 13. Discuss the protections afforded by Title VII of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, in the context of discrimination, and recreation, sport, and tourism.
- 14. Identify each of the four steps and their components of the risk management process.
- 15. Describe how to protect yourself and your organization when hiring and terminating employees.
- 16. Identify ways to avoid the pitfalls associated with claims of sexual harassment while at the same time protecting the rights of the individual(s) making the claim.
- 17. Summarize the purposes, objectives, and methods in developing an employee safety and health program.

Course Requirements

Final Exam: 250 points total

The Final Exam will be primarily taken from the unit test concepts.
