Course Description

This an introductory course in directing for the stage. Students are expected to analyze scripts, direct actors in scene work, and explore blocking to create compelling stage pictures. The skills practiced in this course are required in leading a team of fellow artists through the process of directing a live theatrical production.

- **SLO 2** The student will develop the ability to employ analytical and critical thinking skills through directing, playwriting, theatre history and script analysis. They will work creatively and concretely with actors and technicians in mounting laboratory theatrical productions.

SLO 3 The student will demonstrate and apply standard industry practices to all aspects of production.

Course Objectives

- Demonstrate intermediate-level mastery of script analysis.
- Demonstrate an understanding of the principles of blocking and staging.
- Develop beginner-level mastery of collaborating with actors.
- Articulate the relationships between directors and designers.

Course Requirements and Assignments

Attendance & Participation: Your attendance and participation grade are worth a combined 20% of your overall grade. More importantly, your fellow classmates depend on you, just as you depend on them, to show up and collaborate. Theatre is an inherently collaborative art form and the first step in collaboration is showing up. Show up for yourself and show up for your collaborators.

Excused Absences: Excused absences from class include: a university event for which you are required to attend, religious holidays, an illness (a doctor's note must be submitted to the instructor), a death in the family (an obituary or funeral program must be submitted), or court dates (an official notice from the court must be submitted). If you miss a project deadline or presentation due to illness you must provide written documentation from the health center (or an outside health care provider), verifying dates of treatment, and the period during which you were unable to meet academic responsibilities. **All other absences will be marked as unexcused.**

Cell phones, texting, and engaging in activities unrelated to class are strictly prohibited. If you choose to engage in such activities, you may be asked to leave the class and you will be marked as absent.

Assigned Reading: Directors read a lot. The assigned readings are required. Do the reading.

Script Analysis: You will analyze two plays this term: *The Seagull* by Anton Chekhov, and a script of your choosing for the final (a list of approved plays will be provided by the instructor).

Picturization Presentations: You will direct and present <u>two</u> picturization exercises in class. These picturizations are intended to help you tell (or "show") a story through blocking and stage pictures. You are allowed to use sound in <u>both</u> picturizations and <u>minimal dialogue in the second picturization ONLY</u>. Consider the nine viewpoints in these picturizations: **shape**, **spatial relationship**, **tempo**, **topography**, **gesture**, **architecture**, **kinesthetic response**, **repetition**, and **duration**.

Audition: As a class, you will hold auditions for the Directing Finals. These auditions will be either in the afternoon or evening on a day agreed upon by all members of this course. The experience of auditioning actors is invaluable, even if you don't wish to pursue director.

Directing Finals: Your final for this class is to direct a 8-10-minute scene from a full-length play selected from a list of approved plays provided by the instructor. You must rehearse with your actors for a **minimum of 3 weeks**. I recommend rehearsing at least 3 times a week for 40 - 60 minutes each time. You are free to use any actors you wish, but they must be available for **all rehearsals and both performances.**

Supplemental requirements include the following:

- A ground plan for your set (all set pieces and entrances/exits)
- Written description with images (can be a collage or a book of images) of your ideas for lighting, sound, costumes (including makeup if applicable), and props for your scene.
- A director's concept statement. This statement must include your analysis of the entire play. Your design concepts must focus specifically on your selected scene, but you must write about it in the context of the entire play.
- A copy of your rehearsal notes. This may be handwritten, or you may type up your handwritten notes to submit.
- A 2-page reflection paper detailing your directing experience.

Directors must arrange a visit from the instructor to at least one rehearsal.

Format: All written assignments must be typed, double-spaced, and written in 12-point Times New Roman or comparable font.

Time Management: Do your best to submit assignments on time. Consider your other commitments and do your best to manage your time appropriately. If you find yourself struggling to meet a deadline, please contact the instructor as soon as possible.

Academic Integrity: The University has a Code of Academic Integrity, which prohibits, among other things, cheating on exams, plagiarizing papers, or portions of papers, submitting the same paper for credit in two courses without authorization, buying papers, submitting fraudulent documents, forging signatures, and using unauthorized study aids (including old quizzes and exams). D = Below Average. Work shows errors, careless mistakes, or is just plain wrong. Poor scholarship

F – Failure. Material incomplete. Work grossly negligent or incomplete. No evidence of scholarship present.
