Course Description:

This course is an introductory course that will be delivered through BlackBoard and Collaborate.

The course is designed to help students answer the following questions:

What is art?

What does a work of art mean?

What drives an artist to create?

What makes art valuable?

Why is art important?

The course will examine the vocabulary used to describe art, discuss the processes involved in creating art, and survey the history of art over time. By the end of the semester, students will gain a deeper appreciation of artists and their work, along with an enthusiasm and understanding of the visual arts that will enrich their lives.

2. Students will be introduced to the elements, principles, theories, and styles of art.
3. Students will be introduced to the tools and techniques of making art.
4. Students will utilize these processes to create art.
5. Students will gain an awareness of art history in an abbreviated form.
6. Students will develop critical thinking skills through the examination of individual works of art.

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7. Students will be able to synthesize, describe, and place works into social and historical contexts.
8. Students will learn to develop and express ideas clearly, consider the effects of meaning and message, as well as other communication skills, by working together in groups, creating presentations, and through hands-on projects.
9. Students will develop teamwork skills by working together in groups on assigned tasks.
10. Students will develop an appreciation for the visual arts, crafts, and the human imagination.
11. Students will develop personal and social responsibility through management of individual and group requirements within the course, as well as through examples of personal and social justice inherent in the history of art throughout the world.

You will be graded on: **Participation, Formal Analysis Papers, Artist Spotlight Analysis Responses, and two exams, the midterm and final.** Students are required to participate in discussions. If you rarely or never offer thoughtful comments or questions, you will only get half credit for your participation grade. If you aren't comfortable speaking in front of the class, please come and discuss your concerns with the professor. Details on each assignment (creative projects) will be presented when assigned.

The **Formal Analysis Essays** and **Artist Spotlight Analysis Responses** consist of a minimum of a 250-word paper, written in MLA format. **Formal Analysis Essays** are reflections on a work of art discussed in class. **Artist Spotlight Analysis Responses** will be assigned from the uploaded video options selected from the Louisiana Channel Videos on the arts, featuring the artists (available on Blackboard). Note: All writings should exhibit concise reasoning, good organization, and proper formatting.

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Note: Footnotes and bibliography are not required, but if you do use outside materials, you must use footnotes and you MUST observe proper stylistic and formatting rules.

NOTE: Late work will have a deduction of 10 points per week from the total grade after the due date.

Extra Credit: Earn extra credit by visiting an art gallery, happening, museum, artist studio and document the visit with a written formal analysis as defined below. Respond to the two additional discussion topics posted in Blackboard.

Attendance: Nine absences result in you being dropped from the course with a grade of "F" as per university policy. Upon the 4th unexcused absence, you will be dropped one letter grade. Upon the 6th unexcused absence, you will be dropped another letter grade. Upon the 8th unexcused absence, you will be dropped yet another letter grade. If you must miss a class for a school-related activity, the absence must be discussed (and arrangements made regarding coursework) before the absence. 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Rubric for Formal Analysis Essays and Artist Spotlight Analysis

Note: The rubric for Formal Analysis #1 and the final essay (Formal Analysis #2) will be utilized for the Core Assessment—skill objective: Critical Thinking.

- **Formal Analysis 1 & 2:** Critique employing Elements, Principles, and Functions Art. A concise formal essay written in the third person, comprising of five paragraphs: Introduction/Thesis, and three body paragraphs focusing on the Elements, Principles and Functions of Art.
 - *Introduction: Purpose/thesis, art information, and description; 20 points*
 - *Body Paragraph (Elements): Main ideas, supporting details, and analysis; 20 points*
 - *Body Paragraph (Principles): Main ideas, supporting details, and analysis; 20 points*
 - *Body paragraph (Functions/Social Responsibility): Main ideas, supporting details, and analysis; 20 points*
 - *Conclusion: Summary statement, critique/judgement; 20 points*

Total points: 100 each

- **Artist Spotlight Analysis 1, 2, & 3:** Watch the selected Louisiana Channel, Video on the arts, featuring the artists' selected and posted to Blackboard.
 - *Write a brief essay response reflecting on the elements of art the artists' use in their work (20 points), define their working medium or mediums using an artistic vocabulary (20 points), describe how the artists uses the principles of art in their practice (20 points), explain the social and cultural relevance of the artists' work (20 points), share your personal critique on the impact of the chosen artists' practice in relationship to art appreciation. (20 points).*
