### **2. Course Overview**

- This course is designed as an introduction to public speaking and speech preparation. It is also intended to develop your research, analytic abilities, writing skills and awareness of current events.
- By the end of this course you will be able to research an issue, develop a speech and deliver it in a professional manner.
- There will be periodic presentations of videos depicting both real and fictional situations in public speaking: television interviews, Facebook Live, Dramas etc.
- Assignments and tests will be administered in person.

### **3. Course Primary Learning Objectives**

- By the conclusion of this course the student should be proficient in:
  - i. Current news events and analysis
  - ii. Issue and opinion research
  - iii. Audience analysis
  - iv. Talking point development
  - v. The elements of a speech and public-speaking delivery
  - vi. The Law as it relates to public speaking: incitement, accuracy, defamation etc..
  - vii. Responding to an interview
  - viii. Development and delivery of public speaking content

### **4. Student Learning Outcomes**

- The successful student will be able to:
  - i. Research and developing a point of view
  - ii. Analyze an audience and tailor public speaking content to it
  - iii. Develop public speaking content for a variety of venues for themselves and others
  - iv. Understand the law as it relates to public speaking

**5. Course Requirements**

- Students are expected to attend class and participate in exercises. Probationary status if you miss five classes. You may be dropped from the class if you miss more sessions.

- Each student will be graded on the basis of adherence to the assignment's guidelines in an effective and comprehensive way. Effort and improvement over the course of the term are the two most important criteria for grading.
- Evaluation of performance in this class is largely subjective, and as such this aspect of the class will be solely at the professor's discretion.
- There will be regular unannounced news quizzes during class
