Course Description:

This course is an introductory course that will be delivered through **Blackboard** and **Class Collaborate**.

The course is designed to help students answer the following questions:

What is art?

What does a work of art mean?

What drives an artist to create?

What makes art valuable?

Why is art important?

The course will examine the vocabulary used to describe art, discuss the processes involved in creating art, and survey the history of art over time. By the end of the semester, students will gain a deeper appreciation of artists and their work, along with an enthusiasm and understanding of the visual arts that will enrich their lives.

Student Learning Outcomes facilitated by Art Appreciation are:

1. Students will become aware of the vocabulary used to discuss and describe art.
2. Students will be introduced to the elements, principles, theories, and styles of art.
3. Students will be introduced to the tools and techniques of making art.
4. Students will utilize these processes to create art.
5. Students will gain an awareness of art history in an abbreviated form.
6. Students will develop critical thinking skills through examining individual works of art.
7. Students will be able to synthesize and place works into social and historical contexts.
8. Students will learn to develop and express ideas clearly, consider the effects of meaning and message, as well as other communication skills.
9. Students will develop an appreciation for the visual arts, crafts, and human imagination.
10. Students will develop personal and social responsibility through management of individual and group requirements within the course, as well as through examples of personal and social justice inherent in the history of art throughout the world.

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Academic Integrity Students in this class are expected to demonstrate scholarly behavior and academic honesty in the use of intellectual property. Students should submit work that is their own and avoid the temptation to engage in behaviors that violate academic integrity, such as turning in work as original that was used in whole or part for another course and/or professor; turning in another person's work as one's own; copying from professional works or internet sites without citation; collaborating on a course assignment, examination, or quiz when collaboration is forbidden. This policy indicates the following constitute violations of academic honesty: a student has another person/entity do the work of any substantive portion of a graded assignment for them, which includes purchasing work from a company, hiring a person or company to complete an assignment or exam, and/or using generative AI tools (such as ChatGPT).

You will be graded on: **Participation (assigned discussion topics), Formal Analysis Essays, Artist Spotlight Analysis Responses, and two exams: the midterm and final.** Students are required to participate in assigned discussion topics through Blackboard.

The **Formal Analysis Essays** and **Artist Spotlight Analysis Responses** consist of a minimum 250-word paper written in MLA format. **Formal Analysis Essays** are reflections on a work of art discussed in the textbook from class lectures. **Artist Spotlight Analysis Responses** will be assigned from the uploaded video options selected from the Louisiana Channel Videos on the arts, profiling a specific artist (available on Blackboard). Note: All writings should exhibit concise reasoning, good organization, and proper MLA formatting.

Note: Footnotes and bibliography are not required, but if you do use outside materials, you must use footnotes, and you MUST observe proper stylistic and formatting rules.

NOTE: Late work will have a deduction of 10 points per week from the total grade after the due date.

Extra Credit: Earn extra credit by visiting an art gallery, museum, sculpture park, public artwork, or artist studio and documenting the visit with a written formal analysis as defined below in the grading rubric on page

NOTE: Make-up work will be permitted. It is the student's responsibility to contact the professor and arrange it.

Attendance In-person/Synchronous; Nine absences result in you being dropped from the course with a grade of "F" as per university policy. Upon the 4th unexcused absence, you will be dropped by one letter grade. Upon the 6th unexcused absence, you will be dropped by another letter grade. 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Grading Rubric: Formal Analysis and Artist Spotlight Analysis Essays

Note: The rubric for Formal Analysis #1 and the final essay, Formal Analysis #2, will be utilized for the Core Assessment—skill objectives: **Communication, Critical Thinking, Personal and Social Responsibility**.

Formal Analysis Essays #1 & #2

Objective: Analyze employing **elements of art, principles of design, and functions of art** of the chosen artwork from our textbook reading in a concise formal essay comprising of five paragraphs: Introduction/Thesis, three body paragraphs focusing on the Elements of art, Principles of design and Functions of Art, and a conclusion paragraph with a personal critique of the artwork clearly stated (5 paragraphs outlined below).

- **Introduction: Purpose/thesis**, artwork information (title, artist, date created, medium of artwork), and description; 20 points
- **Body Paragraph 1: Elements of Art** with supporting details and analysis; 20 points
- **Body Paragraph 2: Principles of design** with supporting details and analysis; 20 points
- **Body paragraph 3: Functions & Social Responsibility** with supporting details and analysis; 20 points
- **Conclusion:** Summary statement, personal critique; 20 points

Artist Spotlight Analysis #1, #2, & #3

Note: The rubric for Artist Spotlight Analysis #1, #2, and #3, will be utilized for the Core Assessment—skill objectives: **Communication, Critical Thinking, Social and Personal Responsibility**.

Objective: Write a concise essay response after watching the assigned **Louisiana Channel, Video on the Arts**, featuring the artist selected and posted to Blackboard as stated in the syllabus (5 paragraphs outlined below).

- **Introduce the artist** and their working artistic mediums; 20 points
- **Analyze the elements of art** the artist uses in the creation of their work; 20 points
- **Describe** how the artist uses **the principles of design** in their practice; 20 points
- **Explain the social and cultural responsibility and relevance** of the artist's work; 20 points
- **Share your personal critique** on the **impact** of the artist and their work **in relationship to art appreciation**; 20 points
